### Presentation(s) at the University Education in Natural Resources Conference Report in Fulfillment of a Professional Development Grant

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# **B.** Restatement of problem researched, creative work, or professional enhancement opportunity.

The principal investigator completed two presentations to the University Education in Natural Resources conference which took place in Fort Collins, Colorado March 22, 2012 through March 24, 2012. Funding was used to defray travel expenses. One of the presentations was a poster presentation; the other a speaking presentation. The poster was about ATU student assessment of what the students learned while participating in Russellville 5<sup>th</sup> grade camp. The other presentation was about the redesign of the Recreation and Park Administration internship program in response to new outcome based standards from the program's accrediting organization.

## C. Brief review of the professional enhancement opportunity, creative work, or research procedure.

Through participation in this conference I was able to present a poster on our annual participation in the Russellville 5<sup>th</sup> grade camp. While putting together the poster I learned that is best to finalize its design earlier than I did. Both of the large format printers on campus were out of one color of ink and so were unable to print the poster. The UPS Store was able to print the poster and provide a mailing tube for transportation at a cost of \$150.00 which was not part of the original grant request. People on campus who had the printers in their departments were helpful, they just didn't realize they were low on ink, which would not have been a problem if I had allowed more time. The poster was well received and provided me with some good feedback on how to improve the work.

The second presentation was part of a break-out session on service learning. It described the recently redesign of the internship course in recreation and park administration. In response to my observation that our students were having trouble fitting the pieces of our curriculum into a coherent whole, one of the participants, a recent graduate of CSU who was employed to concept map the conference, made the observation, that perhaps that was the real value of the internship; that the internship was where the students were going to work to synthesize the disparate parts of the curriculum into the whole and perhaps I should not have expected them to do this earlier. Upon reflection I had to agree that our internship course is a very good capstone experience where students should use information from previous courses to successfully complete what should be and is usually the last course before graduation.

### D. Summary of findings, outcomes, or experiences had.

Through the support provided by the professional development grant I was able to attend the 9nth biennial University Education in Natural Resources Conference March 21 through March 24, 2012. I used March 22 and March 25 as travel days as it takes several hours to travel between Russellville and Fort Collins, Colorado, the site of the conference, even using airlines. While there I attended several presentations. The two that I have talked about most since my return were two of the keynote addresses. The first was given by the new Dean of the Natural Resources School at Michigan Tech. He talked about trends in enrollment and how natural resource and environmental science programs have much larger enrollment growth than forestry and wood science. The second key note was provided by the head of Wyoming state parks. He talked about how he was able to be successful in his career, being a 1999 graduate of Colorado State University. He also talked about trends in society that are affecting state parks and conservation in general. Another presentation that stood out was a discussion of the new leadership program in the Warner School of Natural Resources at Colorado State. The program enrolls student cohorts into learning communities where the students study leadership and wind up with a project often in Mexico. As I have been on the peer review committee with the Center for Leadership and Learning on our campus, this program at CSU was of interest in that they were developing the scholarship of leadership in a natural resource context. The entire conference was first rate with very good speakers. 150 people attended from 46 institutions and three countries. I mostly attended those sessions that involved service learning and internship. The group that initiated the conference is composed of the forestry/natural resource programs at the nation's land grant universities and historically African-American universities.

### E. Conclusions and recommendations.

The conference was a good learning experience and I am happy I was able to attend. The conference was focused on teaching and curriculum development in areas that are similar to the natural resource emphasis in the Recreation and Park Administration program. I recommend that other professors who teach in the natural resource area attend the conference. The conference selects the next host institution during the conference. Arkansas Tech may want to consider hosting the conference in the future.
