I. Student Success – Dr. Jason Warnick

a. Tech Advise Information

Advising model for freshman; half-day program for students that will allow for college and department interaction, parent sessions, and end with group advising. 73 students have already signed up for the different sessions. Dr. Warnick will send out more information regarding numbers closer to each session. If you have specific needs for your session, please contact Meighan Burke, mburke1@atu.edu.

The outcome is to engage the students, give them an introduction to our majors, and make a final sale to get students excited about attending ATU. Sessions are designed to have between 100 – 120 students. The deadline to register is the week before each session.

Dr. Warnick has been working with Barnes and Noble on ways to make textbooks more affordable. A 6-month subscription to an ebook manufacture can cost students about \$119. This subscription would allow students to get ebooks on the first day of class. February 26, in Doc Bryan 242 11 am – 2 pm will be the Faculty Textbook Affordability Fair. Cengage, Pearson, and McGraw-Hill reps will be on campus pitching their materials. Kelcie Pagel, B&N Manager, will be on hand to process textbook adoptions. Ken Wester: Adobe Creative Cloud is now available to all faculty and staff on both campuses. Just a reminder, to not update the current software on your computer. Each person has the option to use two licenses; one on their office computer and one other device.

As phishing scams increase, all faculty and staff are discouraged from using their ATU ID on external sites. If the account is not Tech related, it would be best to use a different ID and password.

Dr. Cezeaux: Thanked Dr. Robertson and Dr. Bright for help on the Grade Appeal and Academic Integrity policies. Major changes include deadlines and final decisions made by the Dean or Ad Hoc committees. The student handbook is updated and approved by the Board every August so changes should be submitted before the Student Affairs deadline. Changes need to be submitted for review by the Faculty Senate and Executive Council also.

Mr. Etzel: Following the Strategic Plan, Goal 4, the Library has several community engagement opportunities coming up for spring 2019. Dr. Stan

Dr. Woods: There is currently one student enrolled in the study away program and four students have signed up for next year.

There are 400 plus student applications and about 25 faculty applications for Arkansas Governor's School. Faculty interested are still encouraged to apply.

At the time, there were issues of access, timing, and ease of use. Dr. Cezeaux: How do other colleges verify if courses meet the college distinction requirement? Deans shared they left this up to the departments. Dr. Jenkins shared with the Honors courses, students enroll in the course and are required to complete 20 additional hours of work.
