Matt Myers – I’m Not Good at Math: The Dangers of Mathematical Illiteracy in a Quantitative and Technological Society

This talk will present some of the negative results occurring in our culture due to the general population not understanding the mathematical concepts that drive our society. This will include the impact on individual finances, political decision making, and cultural interactions.

Greg Michna – Encountering the Other: Religion in the Colonial Atlantic

This talk will examine notable instances in colonial history where religious encounters with the other have led to outbreaks of violence, and other cases where religious belief led individuals to see past differences and embrace people different from themselves. The talk will also address how these historical examples are relevant today, and how we might draw on religious encounters from the past and apply them to contemporary issues.

John Anglin – Tales From the Front

Increasingly, museums are heeding these calls. Why? What are the legal and moral arguments on which these repatriation claims are made? What is the basis for these arguments? What are the risks and rewards of repatriation? Who should own 3,000 year old Native American bones? The Mona Lisa? A tribal Hopi katchina mask? The Elgin Marbles? Join me for discussion and debate.
