Earlier issues of the *JBAO* brought research from varying perspectives. Drs. Logan, Price and Green examine the impacts of industrial diversification and sector volatility on regional employment growth. They find that industrial concentration and employment growth are related using NAICS and labor market data from 2009-2017. However, industrial sector volatility is not significant in their models. The study has implications for regional economic policy.

Drs. Stevens, Silver, Richards and Campbell look at faculty and student perceptions regarding violations of academic integrity, especially in online courses. Their findings suggest that faculty and students alike recognize the threat of academic dishonesty in university education and the role that technology has in its rise. Their findings on pedagogical measures to stop cheating, however, question the intention of educators to seriously guard against this threat.

Drs. Kilburn, Kilburn and Williams take a look at the role of first impressions in influencing students to spread positive word of mouth about a university to others in their circle. They find significant impacts from the quality of the university's website and admissions office encounters, raising concerns for higher education policies.
