Suggestions for TechTalk 2020

Format

- Good format, well organized, and nice selection of sessions.

Building a Universally Designed Course: Ensuring Inclusion for All Students

Erica L. Wondolowski, Ph.D., CRC, Assistant Professor of Rehabilitation Science, Behavioral Sciences

In today's society, students with disabilities are sometimes seen as an afterthought for whom professors make accommodations only as they are needed. But what if, beginning at the very creation of a course and related materials, accessibility was the basis on which we build? Rather than students needing to self-disclose their disability status, they would already have the materials they need in the format required, allowing them to remain anonymous, protecting their privacy, and not being made to feel self-conscious. This presentation focuses on resources and steps that can be taken to help achieve this aim.
