Course objectives: We study moral philosophy because common sense morality often needs to be clarified, and even then, there are times when common sense fails to give us clear instructions on how we should behave. This course takes a close look at some of the most important and influential ethical theories of all time, theories that can help us better understand what is right when common sense morality fails. Next, we seek to apply ethical theory and common-sense morality to some of today’s most controversial moral questions. We also discuss the importance of good character and individual freedom. Good character is the foundation of morality, and neither good character nor sound moral judgment can be developed unless individuals are largely free to make their own choices. This course is intended for those seeking a general introduction to philosophy through the active use of moral reasoning and moral imagination.

 2. You will have the chance to develop the ability to reason critically about difficult philosophical issues and texts.
