# SENIOR RESEARCH PROJECT PROPOSAL MENTOR STATEMENT - Example

Project Title: "Exploring the Effects of Unicorn Sightings on College Student Motivation"

### 1. Why is the project worthy of honors credit?

This project is worthy of honors credit because it goes beyond typical course expectations in scope, methodology, and analysis. The student is designing an original survey study to investigate how exposure to whimsical or imaginative phenomena (in this case, "unicorn sightings") may influence college student motivation. The project demonstrates advanced skills in research design, data collection, and interpretation, and it addresses a creative and novel research question that has not been explored in the field.

## 2. What makes it unique or challenging for the student?

The project is unique because it combines elements of psychology, behavioral science, and creative inquiry, requiring the student to learn and apply multiple research techniques independently. The challenge lies in designing a credible survey instrument, analyzing both quantitative and qualitative data, and interpreting results in a way that is both rigorous and imaginative. The student is also tasked with developing a framework for understanding how whimsical experiences may influence motivation, which requires synthesis across disciplines.

3. Does the project overlap with a major project? If so, describe the additional work the student is doing beyond normal requirements. While the student is completing a standard senior psychology project on motivation, the honors component adds multiple layers of complexity. Holly is conducting an expanded literature review that incorporates interdisciplinary sources, designing a novel survey instrument, and performing a detailed statistical and thematic analysis of the data. She is also producing a polished report suitable for potential publication or presentation, which goes beyond the requirements of the standard major project and provides a rigorous challenge appropriate for honors credit.

### 1. Why is the project worthy of honors credit?

### 2. What makes it unique or challenging for the student?
