Practical Nursing Information

The Practical Nursing Program of Arkansas Tech University-Ozark Campus is an entry level, 15-month, three-semester nursing program. Upon completion of the program, students will receive a certificate in Practical Nursing (PN). The program integrates theory with clinical practice. Theoretical content is based on the concept of holism, in which the physical, emotional, social and spiritual well-being is considered. Area hospitals, clinics, nursing homes, mental health units and pediatric and adolescent facilities are utilized for clinical experiences, which will require travel at the student's expense. All classes will require access to a computer and/or Internet services.

Upon successful completion of the program, students will be eligible to apply for the NCLEX-PN Exam for licensure. State and FBI background checks are required of each applicant by the Arkansas State Board of Nursing when applying for the licensure exam. An applicant may be denied permission to take the NCLEX-PN Exam based on the background check results.

The Practical Nursing Program at Arkansas Tech University-Ozark Campus has been granted approval by the Arkansas State Board of Nursing (1123 South University Avenue, Suite 800, Little Rock, AR 72204-1619; telephone: 501-686-2700; website: www.arsbn.org).

Admission Criteria

Students wishing to enroll in the practical nursing program should submit an application to the University with an official high school transcript, or GED transcript, and all college transcripts by **March 1 for the August Class and October 1 for the January class.**

Prior to admission to the technical phase of the Practical Nursing program, students must provide the Office of Student Services an Accuplacer, ACT, or SAT score report verifying that remediation in English, mathematics, and reading is not required; or complete the appropriate remedial coursework with a grade of "C" or better to satisfy remediation requirements; and complete HSCI 1113, HSCI 1123 and HSCI 1243 with a grade of "C" or better.

Students who speak English as a second language shall meet the same admission requirements. In order to be considered for admission to the Practical Nursing program, each student must meet the following criteria:

- Eligibility for admission to Arkansas Tech University - Ozark Campus. Meeting the minimum requirements for admission to the university does not guarantee admission to the practical nursing program.
- Completion of Practical Nursing Program Application for Admission for a specific semester. Applications not submitted by the deadline or incomplete applications will not be considered for that semester's class.
- Completion of specified coursework. (Conditional acceptance may be granted to those students who are in the process of completing remaining platform coursework.)
- Hold a current CPR for Health Care Providers certification prior to the first day of class
- Completion of the TEAS (Test of Essential Academic Skills) exam

In addition to meeting admission criteria, students selected for the Practical Nursing program must attend the scheduled Nursing Department Orientation meeting. Applications to the Practical Nursing program may be withdrawn if all of the above criteria are not met. Students not meeting required criteria may be required to reapply to the Practical Nursing program.

TEAS Exam

The TEAS is a computerized test consisting of reading, writing, math and science. Students will be notified by mail after the application deadline with the dates and times available for testing and how to register and pay for the test.

Selection

Due to the number of applicants and the limited number of slots available for each class, the PN Program will use a system of ranking to select students for the class.

- Completion of University admission criteria, i.e. application, transcripts, immunization records.
- Completion of platform courses.
- Completion of Nursing Department application.
- TEAS percentile score.
- Date of receipt of application to the Nursing Department. Applications should be in the Nursing office no later than March 1 for the August class and by Oct. 1 for the January class.
- Attendance of the nursing orientation.
- Selection will be administered by the PN Program.
- To insure a position, students must notify the Nursing Department by the date indicated on the acceptance letter. Your position is only good for the semester in which you received an acceptance letter. Failure to notify the Nursing Department of acceptance or refusal by the appropriate date will cause the nursing application to be withdrawn. Students must then reapply for future semesters.
- Applicants will be notified of status of application/acceptance by mail.

Re-Entry Placement

1. Apply for admission by the March 1 for the fall semester, or October 1 for the spring semester.
2. Schedule an appointment with the program director.
3. Availability of theory and clinical space in the level of the program that best reflects their previous work completed, including clinical hour calculation.
4. Applicant may be required to demonstrate theoretical competency by satisfactorily passing exams that reflect course work the student is seeking credit for with at least 80%. **These exams must be taken prior to the start of the semester the student is seeking enrollment.**
5. The student may be required to demonstrate competency in selected lab skills.
6. Must have left program in good standing

The student will be notified by mail of acceptance or decline of the application for admission.

Clinical Requirements

Criminal Background Investigation:

Students admitted into the PN program will be expected to obtain criminal background checks upon entry into the program. Criminal background checks may be a requirement for attendance at some of the clinical sites affiliated with the PN program. Based upon the results of these checks, an affiliated clinical site may determine not to allow a particular student's presence at their facility. The clinical site has the right to deny a student the permission to perform clinical duties in its facilities. If this occurs, the student may not be allowed to continue in the program if clinical rotations cannot be completed.

Drug and Alcohol Testing:

Drug and alcohol testing may be a requirement for attendance at some of the clinical sites affiliated with the PN program. Based upon the results of these checks, the clinical site may determine not to allow a particular student's presence within their facility. If this occurs, the student may not be allowed to continue in the program if clinical rotations cannot be completed. The student is responsible for the costs associated with any drug or alcohol testing required for attendance at a particular clinical site. In addition, the student is also responsible for submission of testing results to the clinical site that requests the information.

Essential Functions for the Practical Nurse

Successful participation in the PN program includes the ability to perform essential functions, which are necessary for delivery of nursing services in a safe, ethical, legal manner. The essential functions are expected to be demonstrated, with or without reasonable accommodation, by students participating in the PN program. Upon review of Essential Functions for the PN Student included in this packet, the candidate will complete the Acknowledgement of Essential Functions

for the Practical Nurse student form and indicate whether or not they can perform the essential functions. Prior to admission to the program, the student is responsible for providing written documentation of any disabilities, along with evidence for the need for accommodation. Requests for accommodations will be forwarded to the Disability Coordinator for the university. The university will then decide if reasonable accommodations can be made for the student.

Sensory Skills	<p>The student should possess sufficient sensory abilities in order to competently assess and monitor patients. Capabilities required include, but are not limited to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Sufficient visual ability to recognize and interpret facial expressions and body language, identify normal and abnormal patterns of movement, to read or set parameters on equipment, to discriminate color changes, recognize a patient's physiological status, and assess the patient's environment. ● Sufficient auditory ability to recognize and respond to verbal communication,

	<p>auditory timers, equipment alarms, and effectively use devices for measurement of blood pressure.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Sufficient tactile ability to palpate pulses, detect and assess changes or abnormalities in skin texture, skin temperature, muscle tone, and joint movement.
Communication	<p>The student should possess sufficient ability to communicate effectively and competently in the English language with others using appropriate verbal, computer, and written methods. Capabilities required include, but are not limited to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Ability to read at a level of competency that allows one to safely perform the essential functions of an assignment. ● Ability to write in a legible manner. ● Ability to present information about nursing procedures and services to patients, family members, and other health care professionals. ● Ability to recognize, interpret, and respond to nonverbal behavior of self and others. ● Ability to interpret and communicate information regarding the status, safety, and rehabilitation of patients.
Behavior	<p>The student should possess sufficient ability to exercise good judgment, develop therapeutic relationships with patients and others, work in stressful situations, and tolerate close physical contact with patients and co-workers. Capabilities required include, but are not limited to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Ability to work with multiple patients and colleagues at the same time. ● Ability to work with others under stressful conditions.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Ability to work with individuals of varying socioeconomic, ethnic, and cultural backgrounds. ● Ability to act in the best interests of patients.
Critical Thinking	<p>The student should possess sufficient ability to comprehend and process information in a timely manner. Capabilities required include, but are not limited to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Ability to collect and interpret data related to patients and nursing services. ● Ability to prioritize multiple tasks, process information, and make decisions. ● Ability to apply knowledge from education to the provision of nursing services. ● Ability to observe, measure, and interpret normal and abnormal patient responses to nursing interventions and appropriately modify treatment interventions. ● Ability to act safely and ethically in the nursing lab and clinic.

**Program Completion Requirements
Graduation/NCLEX Preparation**

To be eligible for graduation and to be verified with the State Board of Nursing for completion of the Practical Nursing program the student must complete the following requirements:

1. Complete all curriculum courses with a grade of “C” (80% overall). (*See curriculum outline*)
2. Comply with all Arkansas Tech University-Ozark campus requirements for certification.
3. Complete all required clinical hours
4. Submit Procedure/Skills Check-off sheets to clinical instructor for evaluation
5. Prior to completion/graduation from the Practical Nursing program all third level students will be required to complete a nationally normed exam and obtain a score that is indicative of a mastery-level of proficiency. (*See syllabus for LPN-1332Nursing of Adult/Medical Surgical III*)
6. Applications for submission to the State Board of Nursing for approval to write the NCLEX-PN exam will be certified by the program director only after the student has completed the requirements for Graduation/Program completion as stated above.

NCLEX Review/Exit Examination Procedure

The student is allowed a maximum of 5 attempts to pass the exit exam. Any student not achieving a score indicative of mastery-level proficiency on the 1st attempt must complete a review prior to the 2nd attempt at the exam. Review may include completion of ATI non-proctored exams, and/or completion of a focused review of exit exam taken as created via ATI. If student fails to achieve a required score upon the 2nd attempt, the student must consult with faculty to discuss remediation requirements prior to subsequent retake attempts. Student fees paid within tuition cover only the first two attempts. The cost of additional attempts will be the sole responsibility of the student.

Student that has not successfully completed with required score by deadline for semester grades will be asked to complete an Incomplete Grade Contract

If student is not successful upon their 4th attempt, they may be required to enroll in and complete a review course (online or live review or complete specified number of hours spent in focus review ATI) prior to making their 5th and final attempt. Proof of enrollment and attendance will be required. Student is responsible for any additional costs this may incur.

Student should wait a minimum of one week between attempts to allow time to adequately study.

If the student does not achieve the required score upon the 5th and final attempt the student will receive a "0" for the NCLEX Review/Exam portion of the LPN-1332 grade, a failing grade for the course and will be required to repeat all components of the course prior to successfully meeting the requirements for graduation.

* Re-admittance to the course will follow program policy for re-entry.

Financial Aid

Students should contact the financial aid office for assistance with financial aid.

NCLEX / 17-87-312 Criminal Background Check

Students who have completed all the requirements for completion of the Practical Nurse Program will be eligible to sit for the NCLEX exam. Each student must submit a federal and state background check as required by the Arkansas State Board of Nursing (ASBN). The ASBN may deny a student the ability to sit for the NCLEX if the student has a positive criminal background check, even though the student has successfully completed the program. (See 17-87-312)

The ASBN requires the following information from the graduate prior to approval to take the National Council of Licensure Examination (NCLEX).

- Have you ever been convicted of a misdemeanor, felony or pled guilty or nolo contendere to any charge in any state or jurisdiction?
- Have you ever had any license, certificate or registration disciplined (revoked, suspended, placed on probation or reprimanded) or voluntarily surrendered in any state or jurisdiction?
- Are you currently under investigation in any state or jurisdiction?
- Do you currently engage in drug-related behavior, including the use of mood-altering drugs/substances and/or alcohol that would affect your functional abilities to perform while working as a nurse?
- In the last two years, have you been subject to a chemical or alcohol dependency intervention or participated in chemical or alcohol dependency treatment/rehabilitation?

17-87-312. Criminal background checks.

(a)

(1) Each first-time applicant for a license issued by the Arkansas State Board of Nursing shall apply to the Identification Bureau of the Division of Arkansas State Police for a state and national criminal background check, to be conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

(2) At the time a person applies to an Arkansas nursing educational program, the program shall notify the applicant in writing of the provisions and requirements of this section.

(b) The check shall conform to the applicable federal standards and shall include the taking of fingerprints.

(c) The applicant shall sign a release of information to the board and shall be responsible to the Division of Arkansas State Police for the payment of any fee associated with the criminal background check.

(d) Upon completion of the criminal background check, the Identification Bureau of the Division of Arkansas State Police shall forward to the board all releasable information obtained concerning the applicant.

(e) For purposes of this section, the board shall follow the licensing restrictions based on criminal records under § 17-3-102.

(f)

(1) The board may issue a nonrenewable temporary permit for licensure to a first-time applicant pending the results of the criminal background check.

(2) The permit shall be valid for no more than six (6) months.

(g)

(1) Any information received by the board from the Identification Bureau of the Division of Arkansas State Police under this section shall not be available for examination except by:

(A) The affected applicant for licensure or his or her authorized representative; or

(B) The person whose license is subject to revocation or his or her authorized representative.

(2) No record, file, or document shall be removed from the custody of the Division of Arkansas State Police.

(h) Any information made available to the affected applicant for licensure or the person whose license is subject to revocation shall be information pertaining to that person only.

(i) Rights of privilege and confidentiality established in this section shall not extend to any document created for purposes other than this background check.

(j) The board shall adopt the necessary rules to fully implement the provisions of this section.

(k)

(1) The board may participate at the state and federal level in programs that provide notification of an arrest subsequent to an initial background check that is conducted through available governmental systems.

(2) The board may submit an applicant's fingerprints to the federal Next Generation Identification system.

(3) The fingerprints may be searched by future submissions to the Next Generation Identification system, including latent fingerprint searches.

(4) An applicant enrolled in the Next Generation Identification system is not required to re-fingerprint when a subsequent request for a state or federal criminal history background check is required if:

(A) A legible set of the applicant's fingerprints is obtained when the applicant enrolls in the Next Generation Identification system; and

(B) The applicant is subject to the Rap Back service of the Next Generation Identification system.

(l) The Identification Bureau of the Division of Arkansas State Police and the Federal Bureau of Investigation may maintain fingerprints in the Integrated Automated Fingerprint Identification System.

17-3-102 Licensing Restrictions Based on Criminal Records

(a) An individual is not eligible to receive or hold a license issued by a licensing entity if that individual has pleaded guilty or nolo contendere to or been found guilty of any of the following offenses by any court in the State of Arkansas or of any similar offense by a court in another state or of any similar offense by a federal court, unless the conviction was lawfully sealed under the Comprehensive Criminal Record Sealing Act of 2013, § 16-90-1401 et seq., or otherwise previously sealed, pardoned or expunged under prior law:

- (1) Capital murder as prohibited in § 5-10-101;
- (2) Murder in the first degree and second degree as prohibited in §§ 5-10-102 and 5-10-103;
- (3) Manslaughter as prohibited in § 5-10-104;
- (4) Negligent homicide as prohibited in § 5-10-105;
- (5) Kidnapping as prohibited in § 5-11-102;
- (6) False imprisonment in the first degree as prohibited in § 5-11-103;
- (7) Permanent detention or restraint as prohibited in § 5-11-106;
- (8) Robbery as prohibited in § 5-12-102;
- (9) Aggravated robbery as prohibited in § 5-12-103;
- (10) Battery in the first degree as prohibited in § 5-13-201;
- (11) Aggravated assault as prohibited in § 5-13-204;
- (12) Introduction of a controlled substance into the body of another person as prohibited in § 5-13-210;
- (13) Aggravated assault upon a law enforcement officer or an employee of a correctional facility as prohibited in § 5-13-211, if a Class Y felony;
- (14) Terroristic threatening in the first degree as prohibited in § 5-13-301;
- (15) Rape as prohibited in § 5-14-103;
- (16) Sexual indecency with a child as prohibited in § 5-14-110;
- (17) Sexual extortion as prohibited in § 5-14-113;
- (18) Sexual assault in the first degree, second degree, third degree, and fourth degree as prohibited in §§ 5-14-124 — 5-14-127;
- (19) Incest as prohibited in § 5-26-202;
- (20) Offenses against the family as prohibited in §§ 5-26-303 — 5-26-306;
- (21) Endangering the welfare of an incompetent person in the first degree, as prohibited in § 5-27-201;
- (22) Endangering the welfare of a minor in the first degree as prohibited in § 5-27-205;
- (23) Permitting the abuse of a minor as prohibited in § 5-27-221;
- (24) Engaging children in sexually explicit conduct for use in visual or print media, transportation of minors for prohibited sexual conduct, pandering or possessing visual or print medium depicting sexually explicit conduct involving a child, or use of a child or consent to use of a child in a sexual performance by producing, directing, or promoting a sexual performance by a child, as prohibited in §§ 5-27-303 — 5-27-305, 5-27-402, and 5-27-403;
- (25) Computer child pornography as prohibited in § 5-27-603;
- (26) Computer exploitation of a child in the first degree as prohibited in § 5-27-605;
- (27) Felony adult abuse as prohibited in § 5-28-103;
- (28) Theft of property as prohibited in § 5-36-103;

- (29) Theft by receiving as prohibited in § 5-36-106;
- (30) Arson as prohibited in § 5-38-301;
- (31) Burglary as prohibited in § 5-39-201;
- (32) Felony violation of the Uniform Controlled Substances Act, §§ 5-64-101 — 5-64- 510, as prohibited in the former § 5-64-401, and §§ 5-64- 419 — 5-64-442;
- (33) Promotion of prostitution in the first degree as prohibited in § 5-70-104;
- (34) Stalking as prohibited in § 5-71-229;
- (35) Criminal attempt, criminal complicity, criminal solicitation, or criminal conspiracy, as prohibited in §§ 5-3-201, 5-3-202, 5-3-301, and 5-3-401, to commit any of the offenses listed in this subsection; and
- (36) All other crimes referenced in this title.

(b)

(1) If an individual has been convicted of a crime listed in subsection (a) of this section, a licensing entity may waive disqualification or revocation of a license based on the conviction if a request for a waiver is made by:

- (A) An affected applicant for a license; or
- (B) The individual holding a license subject to revocation.

(2) A basis upon which a waiver may be granted includes without limitation:

- (A) The age at which the offense was committed;
- (B) The circumstances surrounding the offense;
- (C) The length of time since the offense was committed;
- (D) Subsequent work history since the offense was committed;
- (E) Employment references since the offense was committed;
- (F) Character references since the offense was committed;
- (G) Relevance of the offense to the occupational license; and
- (H) Other evidence demonstrating that licensure of the applicant does not pose a threat to the health or safety of the public.

(c) If an individual has a valid criminal conviction for an offense that could disqualify the individual from receiving a license, the disqualification shall not be considered for more than five (5) years from the date of conviction or incarceration or on which probation ends, whichever date is the latest, if the individual:

- (A) Was not convicted for committing a violent or sexual offense; and
- (B) Has not been convicted of any other offense during the five-year disqualification period.

(d) A licensing entity shall not, as a basis upon which a license may be granted or denied:

- (1) Use vague or generic terms, including without limitation the phrase "moral turpitude" and "good character"; or
- (2) Consider arrests without a subsequent conviction.

(e) Due to the serious nature of the offenses, the following shall result in permanent disqualification for licensure:

- (1) Capital murder as prohibited in § 5-10-101;
- (2) Murder in the first degree as prohibited in § 5-10-102 and murder in the second degree as prohibited in § 5-10-103;
- (3) Kidnapping as prohibited in § 5-11-102;
- (4) Aggravated assault upon a law enforcement officer or an employee of a correctional facility as prohibited in § 5-13-211, if a Class Y felony;
- (5) Rape as prohibited in § 5-14-103;
- (6) Sexual extortion as prohibited in § 5-14-113;
- (7) Sexual assault in the first degree as prohibited in § 5-14- 124 and sexual assault in the second degree as prohibited in § 5-14-125;
- (8) Incest as prohibited in § 5-26-202;
- (9) Endangering the welfare of an incompetent person in the first degree as prohibited in § 5-27-201;
- (10) Endangering the welfare of a minor in the first degree as prohibited in § 5-27-205;
- (11) Adult abuse that constitutes a felony as prohibited in § 5-28-103; and
- (12) Arson as prohibited in § 5-38-301.

(f) This chapter does not preclude a licensing entity from taking emergency action against a licensee as authorized under § 25-15-211 for the sake of public health, safety, or welfare.

- (g) The permanent disqualification for an offense listed in subsection (e) of this section does not apply to an individual who holds a valid license on the effective date of this chapter.
