EDUCATION AND INDUSTRY 360 PARTNERSHIP

In our profession, the relationships and professional alliances we have with local industry representatives are critical to the fulfillment of our mission as a university. Our advisory boards, program reviews, stakeholder surveys, internships, involvement in civic organizations, and memberships in professional organizations are some of the ways we stay connected to industry and keep our programming relevant and viable in the marketplace. About 1.5 years ago, ATU Ozark and Ozark ABB (Baldor) formed an alliance known as the Education and Industry 360 Partnership. The mission of the 360 Partnership is to explore, implement, and sustain partnerships between education and industry leaders for the purpose of workforce and economic development in the local region and in the state.

The local 360 Partnership currently includes representatives from ATU Ozark Campus, Ozark School District, ABB, Bank OZK, Cass Job Corp, Black Hills Energy, Butterball, Tokai Carbon, Arkansas Valley Electric, Ozark Area Chamber of Commerce, ATCC. We have a goal to expand the partnerships and include more workforce sectors including health care.

During the May meeting, 360 members participated in a collective impact exercise designed to reflect on the difference the 360 group has made since its inception. We think it is important to share some of these with you to encourage you to get involved with the 360 Partnership to impact your program and serve your students.









EDUCATION AND INDUSTRY 360 PARTNERSHIP, CONT.

Here are some of the tangible positive outcomes (in no particular order):

- Increased awareness of career opportunities in this area—which is directly aligned to our mission to help students succeed in school and out of school
- The formation of a list of core competencies that have become the basis of professional development and industry focus and job opportunities
- Increased internships for students
- Scholarship contribution by ABB
- Industry representatives serving on educational/university committees
- Industry representatives have become a part of career education at the local school level including participation in elementary, middle level, secondary, and post-secondary
- Students have benefitted from the direct participation of industry representatives on panels discussing such topics as interview dos and don'ts, resume building, professional dress, etc.
- Increased involvement or new involvement on ATU Ozark and ATCC Advisory Boards
- Networking and activities that have led to recognition by Governor Asa Hutchinson during the Ozark Chamber of Commerce annual meeting
- Relevance given to ACT Work Keys assessment given at the secondary level
- Increased mentors for CASS Job Corp students
- Support for State and Federal grant attainment
- Support for Ozark and surrounding counties to become a recognized Work Ready Community

Several of our ATU Ozark faculty, including ATCC and Adult Education, have attended meetings of the 360 Partnership, and we will be providing you with information about upcoming meetings. 
Dr. Scarborough earned a bachelor's degree in Psychology and Sociology from Ouachita Baptist University in 1991. She continued her studies at the University of Central Arkansas, earning a master's degree in Community Counseling and becoming a licensed counselor in 1994. In 2006, she became an Approved Clinical Supervisor, and in 2009, she became a Board-Certified Professional Counselor. In 2014, she obtained her Ph.D. in Counselor Education and Supervision from Regent University.

Dr. Scarborough is currently employed by Whitson Counseling and Consulting, a private practice in Fort Smith. She specializes in therapy of individuals age 14 years and above with a variety of problems, ranging from anxiety and depression to post-traumatic stress disorders and bipolar.

With over 27 years of experience and credentialing as a therapist, Dr. Scarborough is an asset to the ATU-Ozark campus and our students. She began her role as an adjunct instructor in 2013 when her friend and colleague, Mrs. Lynn Washington, sought her out to help teach in the newly formed Human Services program. Dr. Scarborough has been an adjunct at another larger university, but she says ATU-Ozark's students, staff, and culture are "second to none."

As for her future plans, Dr. Scarborough wants to continue to empower others through her roles as a counselor and as a teacher.

Having qualified, committed adjuncts to assist our programs is of the utmost importance for our students. ATU-Ozark is proud to have Dr. Scarborough as one of those adjuncts. We appreciate her dedication and reliability, and are grateful to have her as part of the ATU-Ozark team.
