


The 30 credit-hour **Master of Arts in Organizational Development and Leadership (MA-ODL)** provides graduate-level instruction in organizational development, leadership development, adult learning theory, training and development, strategic communication and conflict management, budgeting, ethics, and evidence-based decision making. Graduates of the program are prepared for leadership roles in diverse professional settings. This innovative, multidisciplinary program is fully online. Students complete core requirements in organizational development and leadership, as well as nine credit hours of graduate level electives from a non-ODL discipline, allowing customization to meet professional goals and interests. Collaborating departments have already agreed to be a part of the program. The MA-ODL core and elective courses provide graduate-level electives for students in any graduate program at Arkansas Tech University.

Justification/Need for Program

The Department of Professional Studies utilized an Educational Advisory Board's (EAB) market analysis, an Arkansas Department of Higher Education (ADHE) workforce analysis study, a Ruffalo Noel-Levitz (RNL) graduate enrollment analysis, and a future workplace analysis study cited in Workforce Development in Arkansas (WDA) to conduct an analysis of employer demand and competitor programs for the proposed graduate certificate and graduate degree in the area of organizational leadership. The market analysis region included Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Oklahoma, Tennessee, and Texas. EAB reports rely primarily on labor market data from the Burning Glass Labor/Insight tools, as well as the United States Census Bureau, the US Bureau of Labor Statistics, and the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS).

Supporting information includes:

- **Arkansas Market:** Arkansas Tech University's statewide program recognition and the relative proximity of the institution to the Little Rock, AR MSA and the Northwest Arkansas MSA: 1,500 plus employment openings, both rank among the 20 MSAs with the most program demand. (ADHE, EAB)
- **Regional Markets:** Target marketing efforts to prospective students in metropolitan areas in Texas with high employer demand. Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs) in Texas account for three regional MSAs with the most demand: 25,000 plus employment openings: Dallas-Fort Worth-Arlington, TX; Houston-The Woodlands-Sugar Land, TX; and Austin-Round Rock, TX. One of the top 10 regional MSAs with the most relevant employment opening is the Memphis-TN-MS-AR MSA. Promote in-state tuition rates for states contiguous to Arkansas. (ADHE, EAB)
- **Unique in the Region:** A fully online delivery can serve working professionals who must balance academic work with other obligations. A fully online curriculum can distinguish a program at Arkansas Tech University from profiled regional competitors. Only program of its kind in the region. (EAB)
- **Multidisciplinary Curriculum & Focus on Essential (Power) Skills:** Allow students to complete electives or concentrations so they can customize the program to fit their goals and interests. Degree focus on essential skills desirable in the state and region (ADHE, EAB, RNL, WDA)

- **Growth in Field:** 153% growth in master's degrees awarded in Organizational Leadership; 23% growth over last year. 65% growth in doctoral degrees awarded; 307% growth over last year. (RNL)
- **Demand Over Time:** Regional and statewide demand for a masters-level program increased slightly between 2013-2017; the program should be marketed to mid-level professionals in healthcare and other fields to attract prospective students. Health care employers account for five of the top 20 employers with relevant skills, and professionals in the healthcare field can enroll to gain or hone in-demand skills. Potential growth in students seeking online credentials due to changes in the environment and economy. (ADHE, EAB, RNL, WDA)

Survey of Current Professional Studies Students and Recent Graduates

Survey sent to approximately 400 students; 89 student responses:

- 78 participants indicated interest in the degree program
- 72 participants indicated a likelihood to enroll
- 24 students provided contact information to receive information about the degree

Projected Program Enrollment

- 2022 – 2023 15 students
- 2023 – 2024 30 students
- 2024 - 2025 45 students

Projected Graduates (3-5 years)

It is estimated the average student in the MA-ODL program will be a part-time graduate student, as the program facilitates the needs of individuals currently in the workplace or who are mid-career. The typical MA-ODL student will complete 6-12 graduate hours each year. As a conservative estimate, it is projected 30 students will earn the MA-ODL by AY 2028.

Impact on Existing Programs

The MA-ODL requires students to select a focus area. These focus areas are offered outside the department of Professional Studies. It is expected that these departments will see growth in enrollment in courses aligned with the MA-ODL. The MA-ODL is not designed to be in competition with any other graduate degree offered at Arkansas Tech.

The MA-ODL is a continuation in the reconfiguration of degrees in the Department of Professional Studies. The curriculum builds more opportunities for collaboration with other colleges/departments and provides a degree pathway for students to specialize in skills identified as desirable by employers along with concentrations in a variety of focus areas. The MA-ODL will also provide an Associate's to Master's pathway for students. One such example would be a seamless pathway from the A.A.S. in Banking Services to the Bachelor of Arts in Organizational Leadership to the MA-ODL. Students in this pathway would also earn undergraduate and graduate certificates in leadership. This is one such pathway that would be highly marketable to students and employers.

Faculty

Impact on Workload

Full-time faculty load will not change significantly with the addition of the MA-ODL. The following tables outline departmental faculty load projections with and without the MA-ODL, as well as historical data on full-time faculty load and the use of adjuncts. Load projections include a conservative projected enrollment decrease of approximately 6% per academic year at the undergraduate level due to pandemic-related and demographic changes in the available undergraduate population.

Appendix 1: Accelerated Option

Proposed Title: Master of Arts in Organizational Development and Leadership (with accelerated MA option) & Graduate-Level Organizational Leadership Certificate

Proposed Effective Date: Fall 2022

I. Explanation

Introduction - The proposed Master of Arts in Organizational Development and Leadership (MAODL) degree program provides graduate level instruction in leadership development, communication and conflict management, organizational development and change, budgeting, ethics, and evidence based decision-making. Graduates of the program are prepared for leadership roles in diverse professional settings. This innovative, fully online, interdisciplinary degree program consists of a **24 credit hour**, organizational development and leadership focused core and a block of **six credit hours** of graduate level electives selected from non-OL disciplines. Students can package the elective credit hours to specialize in organizational management, nonprofit leadership, emergency management, health informatics, student affairs administration, gerontology, research methods and assessment (for students selecting the thesis option), and interdisciplinary studies. The six credit hour block of electives allows students to customize the program to fit their personal and professional goals.

This degree program supports Arkansas Tech's strategic plan, goal 2.6.

Stackability - The proposed MAODL degree program increases stackability options at Arkansas Tech, particularly for students enrolled in the Bachelor of Arts in Organizational Leadership (BAOL) or two-year programs aligned with the BAOL. For example, students enrolled in the Banking Services A.A.S. program can progress seamlessly to the BAOL and then the MAODL. To increase credentialing opportunities, students can earn both undergraduate- and graduate-level leadership certificates in this associate-baccalaureate-masters pathway. The graduate-level certificate in Organizational Leadership consists of the first 18 credit hours of the MAODL core. The proposed MAODL degree program and graduate-level leadership certificate expand Tech's offering of online graduate programs, increases credentialing opportunities and stackability, and provides interdisciplinary options for students enrolled in Arkansas Tech graduate programs.

Accelerated Option – Arkansas Tech undergraduate students with a senior designation who meet MAODL admissions requirements may apply for acceptance into the accelerated MAODL program. Students accepted into the accelerated program can earn up to twelve credit hours toward the MAODL degree as part of their undergraduate coursework. To do this, students must successfully complete graduate level curriculum within the following undergraduate courses: OL 4043: Ethical Leadership, OL 4443: Professional Leadership, OL 4643: Organizational Globalization and Diversity, and OL 4743/4843: Organizational Change/Training and Development. Credit hours earned in these courses will count toward degree completion at both the undergraduate and graduate level. The intent of the accelerated option is to create an accelerated pathway to a graduate degree. Students enrolled in the accelerated MAODL can

Survey Results: AACSB Institutions and Leadership-Focused Programs

Abstract

To respond to issues related to “ownership” of leadership-focused programs, particularly at institutions with a business school accredited by the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB), the following survey of leadership programs was conducted by the Department of Professional Studies. This survey utilized a representative, randomized sample of AACSB accredited institutions in the United States. The results of the survey indicate at AACSB institutions:

- **70%** of leadership-focused programs are offered **outside of the business school/college**
- **70%** of leadership-focused graduate degrees are offered **outside of the business school/college**
- **78%** of leadership-focused undergraduate degrees are offered **outside of the business school/college**

The results show no one unit can claim total ownership of leadership-focused programs or that leadership-focused programs belong in a business school. Any argument that leadership-focused programs belong in a business school, including those arguments that rely on AACSB accreditation standards, are not based on knowledge of the current landscape in higher education or a sound understanding of AACSB accreditation standards.

Survey Methods and Results

The Department of Professional Studies conducted the following survey of the academic landscape:

- Compiled a list of ALL AACSB accredited schools in the United States (n=530)
- Calculated appropriate sample size for 95% confidence level (n=224)
- Numbered each AACSB accredited institution and generated a random number list of 530 integers between 1 and 530
- Using the randomized number list, we searched each institution’s undergraduate and graduate programs, including certifications and minors using the institution’s website
 - Conducted an additional web search using the following key words: “institution name Organizational Leadership”
 - Excluded programs in education leadership, nursing leadership, I/O Psychology, military leadership, nonprofit leadership, community leadership
 - Focused on organizational leadership, leadership studies, applied leadership
 - Included management and leadership
- Calculated the following:
 - Number of institutions offering undergraduate and/or graduate programs in leadership (not including the exclusions above)
 - Number of organizational leadership, leadership studies, applied leadership undergraduate and graduate programs
 - Number of undergraduate and graduate programs offered in an AACSB accredited college of business
 - Number of undergraduate and graduate programs with any combination of the words “Organizational Leadership”
 - Number of undergraduate and graduate programs with any combination of the words “Organizational Leadership” offered by an AACSB accredited college of business
 - Number of undergraduate and graduate programs with any combination of the words “Organizational Leadership” offered by an AACSB accredited college of business
