Amended Request for Funding

ABSTRACT

I originally was granted \$1,750 in professional development funding to deliver a paper at a literary conference in Liverpool, England. On May 14, 2006, the conference organizers e-mailed me to announce that the conference had been canceled.

While I plan to write this paper (on Stella Gibbons and Muriel Spark) and present it at another conference next summer, it does not require research that would entail serious expenses. If possible, however, I would like to transfer the funds granted to the pursuit of an earlier, half-completed project that would be enriched by research in the British Library in London, and therefore would entail similar travel expenses.

SIGNIFICANCE/NEED

This project is a long paper on changing women's property laws in late Victorian England and the ways in which 1890's fictions employing mesmerism/hypnotism expose public anxieties about women's fitness to regulate any sort of property. There has been great attention to women's rights issues in 19th century England, mainly concerning the suffragette movement and women's higher education, but the impact of property law on literature has been neglected.

Some of the primary materials (popular novels by now-unremembered writers) are unavailable by interlibrary loan, and I perused many of them on an earlier trip to the British Library. However, I had not the time then to research articles in popular periodicals between 1860 and 1900 regarding public sentiments regarding property laws.

Some periodical literature is now available on-line, but much is not, and the British

Library has an unparalleled collection of periodical literature. This is the research I hope
to pursue for about a week in July.

PURPOSE/OBJECTIVES AND DISSEMINATION OF RESULTS

I plan to submit this project as an article of 25-30 pages to either English

Literature in Transition, 1880-1920, or Nineteenth-Century Gender Studies. If the

project flourishes, I would follow up with an article on popular fiction concerning

mesmerism/hypnotism between 1900 and 1930, which evince gradually changing

attitudes towards women's ownership: of their bodies, their children, and their material goods.
