Abstract

I am requesting travel funds for a research trip to Vietnam. The research will be used in support of a biography on William Egan Colby. I received a sabbatical from Arkansas Tech for the spring and fall semesters 2007 and will complete a draft manuscript of the Colby biography that can be marketed for publication by the end of the year. Bill Colby was a behind-the-lines operative in World War II, a CIA agent in Europe in the 1950s, and director of the CIA in the 1960s, but arguably his most significant contribution was in Vietnam in the 1960s as the CIA's Saigon station chief and the head of CORDS--the U.S. military's pacification and nation-building division. Colby led what was arguably the most controversial covert operation in United States history while directing CORDS: the "Phoenix" assassination program that targeted and killed some 30,000 suspected Vietcong in South Vietnam. A full account of Colby's experiences is vital to any meaningful understanding of past and current CIA detention and interrogation practices as well as American nation-building efforts overseas.

Purpose/Objectives and Significance/Need

The biography I plan to write will go beyond the three major works that have already been written by or about Bill Colby. *Honorable Men*, Colby's memoir of his life in the CIA, came out in 1978. The book is essentially a personal recollection. No archival resources or interviews are cited. The same can be said of *Lost Victory*, Colby's account of his experience as Saigon station chief and director of pacification in Vietnam. Soviet, Chinese, and North Vietnamese espionage operations are almost completely absent in Colby's autobiographical accounts. A third major work on Colby, John Prados's *Lost Crusade*, was published in 2003. As a piece of history, the book goes

much farther than Colby's personal accounts. But while Prados's work on the CIA, especially its secret wars and covert operations is extensive, the book struggles as a biography. Prados uses very few interviews, only the most obvious manuscript collections, and depends largely on historian Douglas Valentine's private collection for his material on Vietnam. Prados, more importantly, offers next to nothing in the way of foreign sources. My time to Vietnam will be spent conducting interviews with Communist officials who worked to counter Colby's initiatives and in visiting a tribal community where Colby built a model anti-communist self-defense force. The information gained from these interviews will provide direct evidence of Colby's and the CIA's influence among the Vietnamese and will thus offer a more balanced account of the Americans' successes and failures in the war effort.

Process for Attainment of Goals

Over 7 days in May, 2007, I will conduct interviews in Ho Chi Minh City, formerly Saigon, and in the central highlands town of Buon Me Thout where Colby worked among the Rhade (Ede) tribesmen. I already have contact with two former Vietminh and North Vietnamese military officials, Tran Bach Dang and Bui Tin, through colleagues at Texas Tech's Vietnam Archive. I will find other interviewees through experts at the Cold War International History Project and Brown University's Watson Institute for International Studies. During the trip, I also plan to visit the Vietnamese National Archives Center II in Ho Chi Minh City, which has several collections on the Republican Period in South Vietnam.

Dissemination of Results

Once the manuscript is complete, I will look for publication with a large academic or commercial press. I have a good publication record, with two books to my credit already. The book should have a popular appeal and a larger print run than either of my first two books. Publication hopefully will help Arkansas Tech University in two ways. First it will bring free publicity and exposure to the institution. Second it will improve my courses in intelligence and diplomatic history and hopefully lure students.

Repeated Requests

While I have not previously requested funding for this or any other research project from the Faculty Research Fund, Arkansas Tech has granted my request for a sabbatical in 2007. My application for sabbatical briefly alluded to this request: "There is the possibility that I will need to visit either France or Vietnam to conduct interviews with Colby's widow and colleagues. If that is the case I will apply for a faculty research grant and make the necessary trips in early summer." Colby's widow, Sally Shelton, has agreed to a phone interview, so the trip to France is unnecessary. Given the number of interviews I need to conduct, the language barrier (I do not speak Vietnamese and will need a translator), the fact that the Rhade do not generally use telephones or e-mail, and my need to gain a better first-hand knowledge of the Vietnamese culture (I have never been to Vietnam), the trip to Vietnam will be necessary.

I am only requesting money sufficient enough to cover my flight and lodging. I will cover the expenses for food, a car, and a driver/interpreter myself. The Social Sciences and Philosophy Department and the School of Liberal and Fine Arts have agreed to help fund research trips I will need to take to Washington D.C., Ann Arbor Michigan, and Burlington Vermont and are unable to contribute directly to my trip to Vietnam.
