ABSTRACT: TALLGRASS PRAIRIE PROJECT

This project involves creating a series of artworks based on my experience investigating the Tallgrass Prairie Preserve near Pawhuska, Oklahoma. This preserve is a rare and sensitive ecological area that is contained within the watershed of the Arkansas River. I will create a collection of images, on location, that examine the visual design quality of the ecosystem. Seasonal aspects of space, light, color and texture will be depicted, with a variety of art materials, in order to discover the underlying design of nature within this environment. My field sketches will then be translated into more detailed studio works that interpret the scope of this location.

Another component of this research is to visit the Gilcrease Museum in Tulsa,

Oklahoma. I will examine the field notes and drawings of artist Thomas Moran, who
documented areas of the Far West in the 19th century, and compare my study approach of
the landscape to his.

There will be an exhibit and gallery lecture at the ATU campus in November of 2007.

This exhibit will include preparatory sketches along with finished studio pieces to illustrate the process of developing a visual theme.

PURPOSE / OBJECTIVES

The purpose of this project is to create a series of artworks based on my experience investigating the Tallgrass Prairie Preserve near Pawhuska, Oklahoma. The emphasis will be working on location to interpret the visual design relationships revealed in this sensitive ecosystem.

I will gain knowledge and historical insight into the process of *drawing to gather* information, by examining the hundreds of field sketches of Thomas Moran in the collection of the Gilcrease Museum.

Another goal is to experiment in the creative use of combining traditional drawing/painting media into unique mixed-media compositions that utilize actual elements of the prairie.

This collection of work will have the ability to demonstrate to students the methodical process of creative inquiry into a particular theme. Lesson plans for courses Art 3303, Drawing Studio and Art 3533, Watercolor, will be developed that investigate local environments.

The exhibit of this collection is in line with the Mission Statement of the University, in serving the intellectual and cultural needs of this region, by providing a public venue that acknowledges the significance of a rare and sensitive ecological area through creative interpretation.

The collection of work and the ATU exhibit will provide the base material for future exhibits in other venues that will contribute to a larger public awareness to my work and the Department of Art at Arkansas Tech University.

SIGNIFICANCE / NEED

Over the past twenty years, the majority of my art has involved contemporary landscape themes, derived from a specific geographic place. It is that sense of place that I find important...that complex of natural rhythms merging with the visual impact that human activity has left upon the land. My work has been exhibited in over sixty-five national

and regional shows, acknowledged for merit through twelve awards and is in numerous private and public collections. (See resume)

I feel a part of the American landscape tradition that took root in the early 19th century. Through the philosophical changes that shifted from neoclassicism to romanticism, nature assumed the position of a secular religion. Americans viewed the painted landscape as an integral part of their culture, aesthetic history and destiny as a nation. The Western landscape art of Thomas Moran was instrumental in influencing the U.S. Congress into creating Yellowstone National Park and the National Park system. Today's society has a continued concern for the preservation of natural places. Art continues to provide a venue for a deeper understanding of our environment. This project will allow me to expand my area of study by investigating a new landscape environment through both traditional and contemporary mixed media art approaches.

PROCESS FOR ATTAINMENT OF OBJECTIVES

November 2005- Purchase supplies and travel to the Gilcrease Museum in Tulsa to study the field sketches of Thomas Moran. Proceed the next day to the Tallgrass Prairie Preserve and conduct 4 day autumn field study. Weather, landforms, ground texture, colors, plants and animals are all considered as subject/design material for these drawings. December 05- Purchase supplies with Department contribution and examine design possibilities of field work. January 2006- Travel to Preserve to conduct a 2 day

winter field study of drawings. February/March 06- Continue to examine design possibilities of field work and visual material. Begin to translate work into finished studio pieces that contain improved composition design and clearer narrative content.

April 06- Travel to Preserve to conduct a 4 day spring field study. Budget spending will be complete at this time and supplies should be adequate to complete the finished work.

May 06- October 2007-Develop finished studio art work that reflects the results of the field study. Experiment with combining different materials that aid the art in providing an expanded narrative content and design; and complete studio work. Submit exhibit

proposals for future shows of this work. November 07- Present the exhibit and talk of this

project in the new ATU Art Building Gallery.

There will be a public exhibition of the art work created in this project on the ATU campus in November 2007. This exhibit will include field drawings, studio experiments and finished designed works to reveal the complete process involved in portraying a specific geographic location. A gallery talk will be conducted to aid students and the public in understanding my process of developing a theme. Art courses Art 3303, Drawing Studio and Art 3533, Watercolor, will be modified to include projects of local environment discovery using examples from this study.

Exhibit schedules are planned over a year in advance. Once I have a certain body of this work complete, I will be submitting additional exhibit proposals to other venues in Arkansas and Oklahoma.
