B. Abstract

This project includes two parts. First, a piece will be commissioned from music composer Ken LaFeve. LaFave, who for many years was the music writer/critic for the Arizona Republic Newspaper, and a writer of program notes for the New York Philharmonic among others, is also a very fine composer. He has agreed to write a piece for wind band and clarinet solo with the understanding that several college bands will participate in the project. If Tech were to participate in the commission it would be listed as a commissioner and a premiere performance ensemble. Second, an internet premiere of this new piece will take place. The exciting thing is that each group will perform the piece at the same time and it will be streamed onto the web so that any watcher/listener can monitor different people performing the piece at the same time. The act of premiering a piece with other groups would provide a new and unique opportunity to band director Hal Cooper, the students of the Arkansas Tech Symphonic Band, and clarinet professor Kelly Johnson. It would also show that Arkansas Tech University is on the cutting edge of internet venues for performances. There are also recording possibilities where the online performance could be placed on CDROM and purchased with all or several performances, or just one. The possibilities are endless. In addition, this will be a real news worthy event--probably making national or international news.

C. Purpose/Objectives

The purpose of the project is to give a premiere performance of a commissioned piece on the internet for wind band and clarinet solo. The performance would occur in conjunction with several other college programs at the same time, which would be exciting and challenging. The benefits would be many. First, Arkansas Tech would be listed as one of the commissioners and premiere performers. Second, the exposure of the performance itself would be at least national if not international. Several big schools will be participating in this, and it is exciting to consider Tech among them. Third, the press exposure would bring positive references to Tech, and finally, this type of opportunity is just the project that would promote the technological benefits that Tech has to offer by doing a cutting-edge performance of this type.

D. Significance/Need

The clarinet field is always searching for more literature to perform with wind band. A new piece by a composer of this stature would be a welcome addition to that repertoire. Because so many faculty perform with the ensembles in their own institution, this is a very positive way for Johnson to gain solo experience. Performing new unrecorded works is an additional challenge for all of the performers and conductor, because it is truly up to them to make an accurate interpretation. Students learn how to accompany another individual when playing a concerto, and this is also an important skill. In addition, by bringing this internet premiere to campus, students from all over the world will be able to witness the Tech band under the direction of Hal Cooper and soloist Kelly Johnson. This is a new and exciting movement that is starting to sweep the music world. It would be a wonderful opportunity to get in on the beginnings of such a forward-thinking project.

E. Process for Attainment of Objectives/Goals

Required material:

One piece by Ken LaFeve for Wind Ensemble and Clarinet Solo.

Required equipment:

Video and internet equipment that is available in the Pendergraft Library distance learning classrooms

Timeline:

- Donate the minimum of \$500 toward the commission to composer Ken
 LaFeve. He will then write the piece.
- 2) Once completed, the new piece will be sent to all of the participating schools.
- 3) Johnson will stay in contact with LaFeve about possible performance dates and eventually pick the date. Johnson will reserve the performance space.
- 4) Hal Cooper will prepare the score and rehearse the band. Kelly Johnson will prepare her part and then rehearse with the band.
- Necessary steps will be taken to set up the internet connection. Although an internet 2 connection is preferred, we have been told that any school with distance learning classes will be able to participate.
- 6) Johnson will advertise the performance.
- 7) The premiere performance will commence some time in the spring 2006 semester. Hal Cooper will have a live feed of Ken LaFeve giving he downbeat. From there, each band director will continue on his own while his group is being streamed onto the web.
- 8) Recordings will be made and distributed.
- 9) The final report will be written and completed by June 1, 2006.

F. Dissemination of Results

The result of this project will be a performance by the Arkansas Tech Symphonic Band under the direction of Hal Cooper with clarinet soloist Kelly Johnson. We will advertise in advance through the ASBOA website and email list serve, newspaper (local and school) radio, and posters. In addition, a written report will be turned in that evaluates the success of the project.

Hal Cooper just completed his 26th year as Director of Bands and Associate Professor of Music at Arkansas Tech University. His duties include directing all aspects of the band program, teaching conducting, marching band techniques, band laboratory and music administration. He has also directed the jazz ensemble and university-community orchestra in years past. He is director of the well-known TECH Music Camps which attract over 1700 students to campus during the summer.

He holds Bachelors and Masters degrees from Henderson State, where he studied and performed with Wendell Evanson. He has also done advanced work at the University of North Texas, where he studied with Robert Winslow.

Professional memberships include CBDNA (past president SW division), Phi Beta Mu (past two-term president), Kappa Kappa Psi (past district governor), Arkansas Bandmasters Association (past president and charter member), and he was elected to membership in the American Bandmasters' Association in 1992.

Cooper's professional involvement is significant, working as clinician and adjudicator in Arkansas and across the nation. He has conducted honor groups all over Arkansas as well as Missouri, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas, Arizona, Tennessee, Mississippi, Colorado and South Carolina. He is a performer on the double bass and electric bass and has performed with the Fort Smith, River Valley and South Arkansas Symphonics. He is married to Beth (Parsons)Cooper, and has four children: Mindy, Clayton, Lee and Hal Jr.
