### Abstract

I will be presenting four papers total and chairing one panel at the following conferences:

- (1) East/Southeast U.S. Conference of the Association for Business Communication, Tampa, FL, March 16-18, 2006. Paper title: Dimensions and Levels of Organizational Trust
- (2) Southern States Communication Association Annual Convention, Dallas, TX, April 5-9, 2006. Two papers: Friends or Co-Workers: Exploring the Interpersonal Component of Organizational Trust (Applied Communication Division) and Communicating Organizational Trust: An Exploration of the Link between Words and Actions (Theory of Communication Division). In addition to presenting the papers, I will chair a panel "Competitive Papers: Defining and Fostering Excellence in the Study of Perceptions of Gender."
- (3) International Communication Association Annual Convention, Dresden, Germany, June 19-23, 2006. Paper title: Antecedents of Organizational Trust (Organizational Communication Division).

#### Purpose/Objectives

The purpose of my attending the above listed conferences is to present my research on trust and to learn about the advances in organizational communication in particular and the field of communication in general.

#### Significance/Need

The three conferences that I plan to attend are renowned for bringing together outstanding scholars and educators from all over the country, and in the case of the International Communication annual convention, from all over the world. Attending these conferences will help me expand my knowledge on new ideas and various research methods applied in the field of communication. I am also in the process of conducting a new study on trust, which was approved by expedited review by the ATU Human Subjects Committee in November 2005.

The Organizational Communication division had over 100 submissions and the readers did an excellent job evaluating them. Most panels have 4-5 papers scheduled, so please keep this in mind when preparing your presentation. It should be no longer than 12-15 minutes. Every panel has a respondent.

The online program will be available on or about March 15, 2006. You may go online at that time and search the program for your presentation time(s). This year ICA has made a strong effort to provide the audio-visual equipment you requested when you submitted your paper or panel. ICA will not be able to honor requests made after that time.

Instead of a paper distribution center at the conference, conference attendees will be given complimentary online access to all papers prior to and for six weeks after the conference. If you would like to upload a more recent version the paper submission site will be available from April 1 to April 30, 2006. It will not be possible to upload a revised version after that time. All papers will be archived for historical purposes. Beginning February 1, 2006, you may also obtain the reviews for your submission by accessing the submission site on the ICA homepage using the same login as you did with your original submission.

For those of you who have been accepted in the plenary interactive paper session, ICA has given this session plenary status and nothing else is scheduled in this time slot.
