B. Abstract

This is proposal for a paper that has been accepted for the 11th Annual Dickens Society Symposium, to be held at Queen's University, Belfast, Northern Ireland on 11-14 August 2006:

Despite considerable critical consensus on the subject, Charles Dickens actually believed that mechanical invention and literary creativity were two very different modes of production, and thus should be treated differently by the law. According to an article in Dickens's journal Household Words in 1853, 'Between the copyright of a book and the patent of an invention there exists not so much as the bond of a remote cousinship' ('Patent Wrongs' 7.233). The writer, in short, is more closely bound to his creation than the mechanical inventor, whose work may well have proceeded by way of successive stages over a number of years, and have been influenced by the contributions of many other people. A writer has a natural right to property in his literary work, a right denied to a mechanical inventor who uses his intellect to obtain 'something external to himself' that may be profitable even without a patent. The argument expressed in 'Patent Wrongs' is a direct riposte to Thackeray who had equated mechanical labour with literary invention. In contrast, Dickens hewed to romantic ideas of creativity and originality at the very time that such ideas were being called into question by modern technologies of mass production, of copying and imitation, the kind of technologies so visibly on display at the Great Exhibition of 1851.

C. Purpose/Objectives

To examine Dickens's view of literary creativity and to distinguish it from his main competitor in the mid-Victorian marketplace, William Makepeace Thackeray. My argument, which relies on a considerable amount of primary source research, contradicts the general tendency to conflate Dickens's representation of the mechanical inventor with the representation of a literary or artistic one.

D. Significance/Need

My argument directly contradicts the kind of argument found, most recently, in Clare Pettitt's book *Patent Inventions: Intellectual Property and the Victorian Novel*, published by Oxford University Press in 2004. Pettitt is factually wrong on a number of major points, and my argument points this out.

E. Process for Attainment of Objectives/Goals

Again, the proposal has already been accepted for presentation and will be read at the conference in August. I hope eventually to turn the paper into an article. I will complete the actual writing of the paper in the late spring and early summer, several months before the conference.

F. Dissemination of Results

At the conference in Belfast, Northern Ireland.
