## B. Abstract

The Association of Teacher Educators was founded in 1920 and is an individual membership organization devoted solely to the improvement of teacher education both for school-based and post secondary teacher educators. ATE members represent over 700 colleges and universities, over 500 major school systems, and the majority of state departments of education. The ATE office is located in the Washington DC area where it represents its members' interests before governmental agencies and education organizations. In addition, ATE has representatives on the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE) and the Holmes Partnership.

The Association of Teacher Educators (ATE) holds its Annual Conference in February .The 2008 Annual Conference will be held in New Orleans, Louisiana. There are Pre-Conference workshops and I am a member of the ATE Leadership academy that meets prior to the opening of the conference. Advisory programs date back to as early 1880's. Advisory Programs make connections to adults for the young adolescent and also provide a positive interaction with other young adolescents.

Active participation by conference participants will lead to a better understanding of the need to use advisory programs to meet the developmental needs of the young adolescent.

# E. Process for attainment of Objectives/Goals

We will present an expanded version of our paper and lead a discussion, which informs and motivates educators to re-investigate and implement this key component of the Middle Level Concept.

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
