College Student Volunteer Statistics

- From 2002-2005 (pre-Hurricane Katrina) service increased from 2.7 million to 3.3 million
- 44.1% of students participate in "regular" volunteering (12 or more weeks a year)
- In 2010, Arkansas ranked 11th in regards to the rate of college student volunteers in the United States (http://www.volunteeringinamerica.gov/rankings/States/College-Student-Volunteer-Rates/2010)
- Volunteer rates are higher among students who work between 1-15 hours per week

Benefits of Service Learning

"Comparisons with non-service-learning college students revealed that the *service-learning students volunteered more hours, showed larger gains in esteem and protective motives (volunteering made them feel better about themselves and helped them cope with personal problems)*, and showed a marginally significant increase in motivation to volunteer in order to promote personal growth."

Benefits of Service Learning

"The findings suggest that life goals and subsequent service participation are a function of students' citizenship predispositions, the intensity and context of service involvement, and, importantly, the benefits that students derive from their service participation. Becoming a more compassionate and socially aware person as a result of service work is positively linked to committing oneself to a meaningful life marked by helping others, civic engagement, and service." - Rockenbach, A., Hudson, T.D., & Tuchmayer, J.B. (2014).

Working with college students

Recruiting college students to volunteer

• Use Social Media

- Gives students a brief snapshot of your organization
 & volunteer opportunities
- Use the Web
 - Allow students to communicate with you via email
 - Post information with upcoming opportunities
 - Create online forms for students to volunteer
 - Include reliable contact information
 - Advertise one-time events

Working with college students as volunteers

- Allow students to work in groups
- Be flexible with your hours
 - Remember that students aren't always available 9-5 M-F
 - Some students have evening classes and meetings
 - Students may also have jobs
- Engage the passions of a student

Working with college students as volunteers

- Clearly and thoroughly explain your organizations mission
- Discuss volunteer duties & expectations
 - This may include a brief training or orientation
 - Remember volunteering may be a VERY new experience for these students
- Clearly point out who is their key contact for they day
- Give feedback often

Working with college students as volunteers

- Offer a service learning experience that they can add to their resume
- Allow volunteers to take <u>ownership</u> of their work
- Create a genuine relationship with students
 Make it FUN!!!

The Arkansas Tech Student

• 2013: 11,369 students enrolled

- Target student population involved with Campus Life: 5,000
- Registered Student Organizations
 - 120 RSO's
 - 2,502 students involved in these organizations
- Greek Life
 - 9 active organizations
 - 387 Greek students

Service Learning at Arkansas Tech

- Academic Service Learning
 - Partnership between Academic Affairs and Student Services
 - Faculty seeking out opportunities for collaboration
 - The scholarship of service learning reveals that students who participate in service learning activities make better grades, have higher retention rates, and have greater levels of cultural competency (Pascarella & Tereenzini, 2005; Gallini & Moely, 2003; Mooney & Edwards, 2001.)

Service Learning at Arkansas Tech

• Academic Service Learning

- Two courses (General Psychology & Introductory Sociology)
- Student participation
 - 114 students
- Service Hours provided
 - 1078 hours of service
 - \$7,815.50 free labor hours (minimum wage \$7.25)
- Food Drive
 - 432 items for local elementary and middle school students
- Bone Marrow Drive
 - 101 students registered for "Be the Match," National Bone Marrow

Service Learning at Tech

- Alternative Spring Break
 - Students serve and give back to other communities
 - Engage with a variety of community agencies surrounding:
 - Hunger and Food Security
 - Animal Outreach
 - Health & Wellness
 - Poverty
 - Sustainability
 - Community Development
 - Education
 - Neighborhood Renewal

Service Programs at Tech

- Action Days & Service Drives
 - Strive to have one action drive and one service drive a month during the academic school your
 - YOUR agency could be an Action Day or Service Drive!
- Green & Gold Give Back
 - Campus Wide Community Service program

Tech students volunteer because...

- They are required to fulfill service hours for:
 - Fraternity or Sorority Involvement
 - Class credit

- Be willing to provide them with documentation for their service time
