## **Program Discontinuance**

#### Health Information Management, Health Informatics, and K-12 Literacy

Dear members of the Faculty Senate and relevant governance committees. I am writing to seek your review and recommendation by majority vote to support the discontinuance of three academic programs. Two of the three are graduate programs. None of the programs have tenure-track faculty in place. The three academic programs are the following:

- Bachelor of Science in Health Information Management
- Master of Science in Health Informatics
- Master of Education in K-12 Literacy

I will begin with and explanation for program discontinuance of the two health programs and conclude with the K-12 Literacy program.

Program Discontinuance of the Bachelor of Science in Health Information Management and the Master of Science in Health Informatics.

I present this report for your review and to seek your recommendation by majority vote, to support a statement of program discontinuance of the Bachelor of Science in Health Information Management and the Master of Science in Health Informatics.

In the report, we will briefly describe the history of efforts to increase enrollment in these two programs, along with serious on-going discussions to terminate these programs if enrollment numbers did not improve. Following this brief history, we will present evidence that enrollment and graduation numbers continue on the decline, indicating that future cohorts will continue to decrease in size. We will then present evidence that the cost of these two programs significantly outpace all other academic programs, further straining our ability to continue this program.

### A Brief History

Not long after the reorganization of the various colleges, which experienced the move of Health Information Management and the Health Informatics from the College of Science Technology Engineering and Math to the College of Business and Economic Development, then Dean Russell Jones had a serious discussion with the faculty of Health Information Management and Health Informatics. Of particular concern was the cost of the program and the declining enrollment numbers in the two programs.

There were some attempts to improve the BS in Health Information Management. In June of 2023, the Board of Trustees approved a request to take the program online, and the faculty have subsequently worked hard to convert all HIM courses to HyFlex format. While this attempt witnessed a slight increase in the number BS students in the Fall of 2023, the numbers continued to decline the following year.


In more recent years, Dean Tracy Cole has expressed similar concerns about the viability of these two programs, raising her concern with the faculty and with the EVPAA & Provost. In attempts to help the undergraduate program, Dean Cole encouraged the faculty to be more flexible with transfer students when possible. HIM Program Director Sara Daniel began working to establish transfer agreements with Arkansas community colleges, but believed that CAHIIM (their accrediting body) restricted their ability to accept transfer courses, especially when a lower-division course would be substituted for a required upper-division course. The faculty therefore arranged a teleconference with CAHIIM representatives and Tammy Weaver to determine the circumstances under which transfer credits could be accepted, and subsequently began working to determine more conducive transfer agreements. The HIM program has since developed a transfer plan that one community college finds acceptable, and has continued working with other institutions toward this goal. Even so, most associate degree programs in this field do not require general education courses, leaving many transfer students with well over 2 more years of coursework to complete the required general education plus at least 40 hours upper-division credits needed for a bachelor's degree.

#### **Continued Decline in Enrollment Numbers**


During the last few academic years, the HIM faculty have made consistent efforts to recruit more students by participating in numerous career fairs and other recruitment activities, advertising their program, and networking in their profession. Even so, we have found it challenging to attract a minimum of 10 students in each HIM class. This current semester, 3000 level courses are averaging 8 students, and 4000 level courses are averaging 6. The table below shows the average number of students and the average number of sections in undergraduate program, followed by the average enrollment in the Graduate Program along with the number of sections.


The figure below shows the number of majors in the BS program over time. In Fall 2024, we brought in 2 Freshmen majors. In 2018, we brought in 8.




When we control for the incoming freshmen class, however, the number of majors decreases significantly. The figure below shows that this fall semester, we had 2 new freshmen majors.



The number of sophomores over time has also continued to drop. The figure below shows the number of sophomores over time. In the fall of 2024, we only had 4 majors. With such a modest pipeline of freshmen and sophomore students, it is clear that this program is simply not sustainable.



This program currently has an Assistant Professor of Health Information Management, and a Senior Instructor of Health Information Management. We had a third professor, an Assistant Professor of Health Information Management and Informatics. This assistant professor has resigned, which leaves us with no faculty members who are qualified to teach graduate-level Health Informatics courses at this time, and current enrollment cannot support replacement of this faculty position.



The undergraduate program currently has an Assistant Professor of Health Information Management, and a Senior Instructor of Health Information Management. Neither are tenure track positions. We had a third professor who taught in the graduate program – an Assistant Professor of Health Information Management and Informatics. This assistant professor has resigned.

#### Cost of the Bachelor of Science in Health Information Management

The Bachelor of Science in Health Information Management is the most expensive program at ATU by SSCH. In the Summer of 2024, Ms. Laury Fiorello, VP for Finance and Administration, conducted an analysis of the expenses per semester credit, and reported that the Health Information Management program cost \$1,555.51 per SSCH (for more detail, see Appendix 2). For comparison, below are the average SSCH expenses for each of the colleges and the Health Information Management program.

•	Arts and Humanities	\$450.64
•	<b>Business &amp; Economic Development</b>	\$554.88
•	Education & Health	\$589.04
•	STEM	\$518.21
•	Health Information Management	\$1,555.51


The Health Information Management program is roughly three times more costly than the college averages. This cost is simply not sustainable.

#### **Request of faculty Senate**

We seek your support in recommending the closure of the Bachelor of Science in Health Information Management and Master of Science in Health Informatics. These two programs have declining enrollment combined with excessive costs, making the two programs unsustainable.

#### Program Discontinuance of the Master of Education in K-12 Literacy

The third program I seek your support for discontinuance is the Master of Education in K-12 Literacy. This program has one professor on a terminal contract, which expires in May. In the Fall of 2024, the program only had 3 students. A year earlier, it had 6 students. The graph below shows the number of students in the Master of Education in K-12 Literacy.




In 2022, we graduated 7 students from this program. In 2023, we graduated 3 and in 2024, we graduated 2. Unfortunately, this program does not have a sufficient number of students to remain viable.

#### Conclusion

While it is never easy to close academic programs, I write to ask for your support to recommend by majority vote, to support the program discontinuance of the Bachelor of Science in Health Information Management, Master of Science in Health Informatics, and the Master of Education in K-12 Literacy.

"Free" Electives in Geoscience Program

Hi Tammy,

As per our conversation on Thursday, this email addresses the issue of "free" electives in the geoscience program. As discussed, the curriculum change aimed to provide students with more flexibility by offering "free" electives instead of limiting them to specific choices during their degree completion. This change was intended to enable students to select courses that align with their interests, such as biology for paleontology enthusiasts, agriculture for environmentalists, or emergency management for hazard-interested students.

However, it has been discovered that students who have transfer credit, changed their major to geoscience, or possess AP/concurrent credit do not have "free" electives. Instead, their electives are taken up by AP credit, introductory courses from previous majors, courses no longer required, or courses from their Associate degrees that don't fulfill major requirements. This situation is concerning because changes to federal financial aid policies may now prevent these students from taking electives that are eligible for financial aid. Approximately one-quarter of our students will be affected in the upcoming fall semester and will not receive their full financial aid due to having more than three hours of electives in their schedule. We anticipate that this issue will affect more students in the future, as less than half of our students have any "free" elective hours remaining.

To address this problem, we propose that we be allowed to approve these electives instead of randomly selecting them. This approach would allow students to receive their financial aid while still fulfilling the original intent of the curriculum change. We kindly request your advice on the appropriate course of action to ensure that these students are not impacted by this unforeseen financial aid policy.
