Note: This is not for general education credit. It is an upper division sociology, psychology and criminal justice elective.

CATALOG DESCRIPTION

This course explores the sociological, psychological, and criminological dimensions of serial and mass homicide. Topics include offender typologies, victim selection, motive analysis, media influence, investigative strategies, and societal responses. Emphasis is placed on theoretical frameworks, structural contexts, and the role of institutions in understanding and addressing these crimes. Students will engage with case studies, research literature, and critical analysis to examine how homicide is patterned, portrayed, and prevented.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Define and differentiate between serial murder, mass murder, spree killings, and other forms of homicide.
- 2. Apply theoretical perspectives to explain patterns of extreme violence while analyzing offender typologies.
- 3. Evaluate structural and cultural responses to homicide, including media, institutional, and public reactions.
- 4. Assess the role of mental health, workplace dynamics, and familial contexts in shaping patterns of murder.
- 5. Interpret real-world case studies involving school, workplace, and medical killing.
- 6. Demonstrate research skills through a final project while integrating data from people working in the field.

LEARNING ACTIVITIES

- 1. Read assigned PDFs and/or webpages each week.
- 2. Watch a video each week relating to chapter material and write a journal entry on it.
- 3. Complete a short quiz and exam each week.
- 4. Select a movie with themes associated with serial and mass homicide and write an analysis of it.
- 5. Complete a research paper (case study) focusing on a specific serial killer or mass murderer, with interview.

Mid-Term Film Analysis and Research Project

-Mid-Term Film Analysis (100 points)

The mid-term film analysis involves writing a five page mid-term paper on a film that relates to serial or mass murder. Details for the paper are in the description in the "Content" area under "Mid-Term Film Analysis." Please write the paper using Microsoft Word and submit it in Blackboard on the due date.

-Research Project (100 points)

For the research component of this course, you must complete a case study of a specific serial killer or mass murderer. Your project should integrate interview data from someone who works in a criminal justice field (ex. law enforcement) and/or an individual impacted by the homicides pertaining to your case. Your paper must be 10 pages minimal. Use Microsoft Word. The instructor posted details for this project under the "Content" area under "Research Project."

Weekly Folder

You will have a folder appear for every week. It includes the course content you need to address for that week. Every week you will have Readings, Quizzes, Journal Entries, and a Test. Per the schedule, as noted above, there will be a Mid-Term Film Analysis and Research Project too.

-Readings

Readings for the course correspond to each chapter. The readings will be PDF documents or Internet links. Readings will appear every Monday morning when scheduled at 12:00 am and be available until the following Sunday at 11:59 pm.

-Quizzes (120 points)

You must take 12 quizzes. They consist of five true/false questions. A quiz file will appear every Monday morning when scheduled at 12:00 am and be available until the following Sunday at 11:59 pm. You will have 30 minutes to complete each quiz. Once you start the quiz, you must complete it in one sitting. You will have three attempts available for you to complete the quiz. The instructor will keep your highest grade. If you fail to logon and take the quiz, the instructor will not allow you to make up the points. Journals open for student access at 12:00 am on Monday and will be available until the following Sunday at 11:59 pm.

-Tests (1200 points)

Twelve 100-point exams exist for this course. They consist of 25 multiple-choice questions. Course Objectives:

The purpose of this course is to introduce the student to the study of Cybercrimes. The student will develop a background in historical and contemporary theories that will examine: definitions of cybercrime, theoretical perspectives of cybercrime, explanations of criminal behavior, the measurement of criminal behavior, enforcement of laws, types of cybercrime, and many more topics.

Format of the Course:

You will engage the material in the following ways: course readings in the textbook, supplemental readings, weekly quizzes, and weekly exams. The study of cybercrime offers a wide range of possible research topics. The goal of this course is to provide an in-depth overview of the major criminological theories surrounding the growing area of cybercrime.

Each week will maintain basically the same structure. You will be assigned chapters and supplemental readings from the textbooks. Also, you will have weekly quizzes and exams. Class will be organized around the material as listed on the syllabus. It is important that you keep up with the readings for each week and complete the assignments on time.

Note: Syllabus dates and assignments are subject to change at the discretion of the instructor. I realize that sometimes life happens and we do not always adhere to our schedules. That being said, I would like for us to focus more on actively learning the material rather than focusing on simply "covering everything."

Textbooks:

SOC/CJ 3223 Cybercrimes

An examination of cybercrime including, but not limited to, the types, historical background, theoretical perspectives, measurement, and law enforcement of cybercrime.

SOC/CJ 4073 Criminal Law

This course covers the substantive foundations of criminal law in the United States including legal theory, statutory interpretation, and real-world case analysis. Particular attention is given to crimes against persons, property, public order, and the state. This course emphasizes both historical and contemporary legal reasoning, with a focus on how criminal law reflects broader social values and constitutional constraints. This course is designed for students in both Criminal Justice and Sociology and is suitable for those considering careers in law, public policy, or justice-related fields.

SOC/CJ 4303 Criminal Evidence

A comprehensive introduction to the principles, rules, and procedures governing criminal evidence in the United States legal system. Emphasizing both theory and application, the course examines how evidence is gathered, analyzed, and used at various stages of a criminal trial. Topics cover include the burden of proof, admissibility standards, and the roles of judges, juries, and attorneys in evaluating evidence. Special attention will be given to how evolving case law and the Federal Rules of Evidence influence trial strategy and the rights of the accused. By the end of the course, students will be able to identify, interpret, and critique evidentiary issues from both legal and sociological perspectives. This course is designed for students in both Criminal Justice and Sociology and is suitable for those considering careers in law, public policy, or justice-related fields.

CATALOG DESCRIPTION

An introduction to the sociological and criminological study of victimization focused on survivors. Topics include trauma-informed theory, national victimization trends, survivor interaction with criminal justice systems (police, courts, corrections), victim compensation, and restorative justice. The course also examines specific crime types, violent, property, intimate partner, family, and sexual offenses, and the application of survivorcentered advocacy and recovery practices.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Identify and define key concepts in victimology from a trauma-informed perspective.
- 2. Analyze patterns and causes of victimization using sociological and criminological frameworks.
- 3. Evaluate criminal justice system responses to survivors, including law enforcement and courts.
- 4. Apply Routine Activity Theory and other victimological perspectives to case scenarios.
- 5. Synthesize real-world knowledge through interviews with victim service professionals.
- 6. Assess and critique restorative justice and survivor-centered policy models.

LEARNING ACTIVITIES

- 1. Review PowerPoint slides each week familiarizing you with chapter material for that week.
- 2. Read one assigned chapter each week.
- 3. Complete a short quiz and exam each week.
- 4. Watch a video each week relating to chapter material and write a journal entry on it.
- 5. Select a movie with themes associated with victimology and write a scholarly analysis of it.
- 6. Complete a research project including an interview of someone currently working in the field.

Mid-Term Film and Research Project

-Mid-Term Film Analysis (100 points)

The mid-term film analysis involves writing a five page mid-term paper on a film that relates to victimology. Details for the paper are in the description in the "Content" area under "Mid-Term Film Analysis." Please write the paper using Microsoft Word and submit it in Blackboard on the due date.

-Research Project (100 points)

For the research component of this course, you must interview someone who works in a field related to victimology. The paper you turn in will follow a question-response format. Your transcribed interview must be 4-5 pages minimal. The instructor posted details for this project under the "Content" area under "Research Project."

Weekly Folder

You will have a folder appear for every week. It includes the course content you need to address for that week. Every week you will have Presentations, Quizzes, Journal Entries, and a Test. Per the schedule, there will be a Mid-Term Film Analysis and Research Project too.

-Presentations

Presentations for the course correspond to each chapter. The presentations are Microsoft PowerPoint files. A presentation file will appear every Monday morning when scheduled at 12:00 am and be available until the following Sunday at 11:59 pm. The instructor recommends that you read each chapter from the text and then view the corresponding presentation.

-Quizzes (120 points)

You must take 12 quizzes. They consist of five true/false questions. A quiz file will appear every Monday morning when scheduled at 12:00 am and be available until the following Sunday at 11:59 pm. You will have 30 minutes to complete each quiz. Once you start the quiz, you must complete it in one sitting. You will have three attempts available for you to complete the quiz. The instructor will keep your highest grade. If you fail to logon and take the quiz, the instructor will not allow you to make up the points. Journals open for student access at 12:00 am on Monday and will be available until the following Sunday at 11:59 pm.

-Tests (1200 points)

Twelve 100-point exams exist for this course. They consist of 25 multiple-choice questions. As designated in the schedule, exams will open Monday at 12:00 am and close the following Sunday at 11:59 pm each week. You will have one hour to complete each exam. INTRODUCTION: This course introduces students to the substantive foundations of criminal law in the United States. Through a combination of legal theory, statutory interpretation, and real-world case analysis, students will explore the essential elements of criminal offenses, including actus reus, mens rea, causation, and attendant circumstances. The course also examines justifications and excuses, inchoate offenses, and the structure of legal defenses. Particular attention is given to crimes against persons, property, public order, and the state.

This class emphasizes both historical and contemporary legal reasoning, with a focus on how criminal law reflects broader social values and constitutional constraints. Students will critically assess the evolving boundaries of criminal liability, the social purposes of punishment, and the impact of overcriminalization and mass incarceration. This course is designed for students in both Criminal Justice and Sociology and is suitable for those considering careers in law, public policy, or justice-related fields.

OBJECTIVES:

- Describe and explain the core elements of criminal liability, including actus reus, mens rea, concurrence, and causation.
- Identify and distinguish between various legal defenses, including justification and excuse, and
 evaluate their application in specific cases.
- Interpret and brief criminal law cases using standard legal analysis, demonstrating understanding of
 judicial reasoning and precedent.
- Analyze constitutional principles that limit the scope of criminal law and apply them to contemporary legal controversies.
- Compare and contrast theories of punishment such as retribution, deterrence, incapacitation, and rehabilitation.
- Examine and explain differences in how selected crimes are defined and prosecuted across jurisdictions.
- Assess the social and policy implications of criminal laws, including issues related to overcriminalization and mass incarceration.
- Apply criminal law concepts to hypothetical fact patterns and formulate legally sound conclusions.

SCHEDULE NOTE: This is a mixed-method course. Typically, in-person meetings are scheduled for Mondays and Wednesdays, while online work is assigned on select Fridays. However, we will meet in person on the Fridays specified below. Should there be any changes or deviations from this schedule, they will be communicated to the class.

REQUIREMENTS:

Online Tests (155 points total): You will take several online tests on the assigned chapters via Blackboard. Once a test closes, it won't be available again until the designated make-up weekend.

Online Activities (125 points total): Online activities will be assigned on Blackboard, due on select days. After the deadline, these activities won't be accessible again until the make-up weekend. 20 points will be deducted from your total points for each activity your will.

Reading Quizzes (170 points total): Given the seminar's format, it's crucial that you stay updated with the readings. To ensure this, daily quizzes will be conducted at the beginning of each class to assess your engagement with the material. These quizzes cannot be retaken for any reason. Your two lowest quiz scores will be dropped. Missing five quizzes will result in your removal from the class.

Midterm and Final (360 points total): Students will take two exams in this course. The dates for these are on the schedule below. The midterm is worth 170 points and the final is worth 190 points for a total of 360 possible points. Due to the nature of the course, the final will be cumulative. Exams will consist of question from the readings, videos, lectures, and class discussions.

Missed exams—Students who miss the midterm will be permitted to make-up that exam only with a documented, verifiable excuse for missing the exam. Furthermore, all make-up exams will be offered only on the final day listed on the course schedule. This means that if you miss the exam for legitimate reasons (sleeping through your alarm is not a legitimate reason), you will have to wait to complete your missed exam until after you take the final during the scheduled final time.

Participation (90 points): Active participation is essential for the smooth flow of the class. It's expected that everyone will come prepared, having completed the readings and ready to engage. Lack of attendance or participation will lead to point deductions.

POLICIES:

Email: I will disseminate class-related information via email. It's your responsibility to regularly check your email to stay updated. For this course, I will communicate through your official university email account. If you use a personal email account outside the university, ensure that emails are forwarded to your preferred address.

I aim to respond to student emails within 24 hours on weekdays. Emails received over the weekend will be addressed on Monday. If your email doesn't contain a question, I might not reply. Please refrain from emailing me to inquire about missed content. I cannot convey lessons via email, and I don't share my lecture notes. You'll need to obtain missed notes from your classmates.

SOC/CJ 3223 Cybercrimes

SOC/CJ 4073 Criminal Law

This course covers the substantive foundations of criminal law in the United States including legal theory, statutory interpretation, and real-world case analysis. Particular attention is given to crimes against persons, property, public order, and the state. This course emphasizes both historical and contemporary legal reasoning, with a focus on how criminal law reflects broader social values and constitutional constraints. This course is designed for students in both Criminal Justice and Sociology and is suitable for those considering careers in law, public policy, or justice-related fields.

SOC/CJ 4303 Criminal Evidence

A comprehensive introduction to the principles, rules, and procedures governing criminal evidence in the United States legal system. Emphasizing both theory and application, the course examines how evidence is gathered, analyzed, and used at various stages of a criminal trial. Topics cover include the burden of proof, admissibility standards, and the roles of judges, juries, and attorneys in evaluating evidence. Special attention will be given to how evolving case law and the Federal Rules of Evidence influence trial strategy and the rights of the accused. By the end of the course, students will be able to identify, interpret, and critique evidentiary issues from both legal and sociological perspectives. This course is designed for students in both Criminal Justice and Sociology and is suitable for those considering careers in law, public policy, or justice-related fields.

This course addresses a critical gap in the Sociology and Criminal Justice curricula by examining how emerging technologies (e.g., artificial intelligence, surveillance platforms, and algorithmic governance) intersect with power, inequality, and institutional change. While AI serves as a recurring example due to its visibility and urgency, the course remains broadly applicable to multiple forms of technological development. No other Arkansas public university currently offers a sociologically grounded course of this nature. The course is designed as an upper-division elective and aligns with Arkansas Act 341 by supporting digital and ethical workforce preparedness. Students gain relevant skills in critical reasoning, digital literacy, and public communication across fields including education, law, social policy, and public service.

White Collar Crime addresses a clear curricular gap in both the Sociology and Criminal Justice programs. While we offer strong coverage of street-level crime and legal processes, we currently lack a course focused on offenses committed from positions of institutional power. These crimes—including corporate fraud, political corruption, and large-scale financial misconduct—often carry far-reaching consequences yet remain underexamined in our existing course lineup.

This course has previously been offered as a senior seminar and consistently received strong interest and engagement from students. Formalizing it as a cross-listed upper-division elective provides a valuable option for students pursuing careers in law, compliance, public policy, and social advocacy. It also supports program goals related to critical thinking, institutional analysis, and understanding structural inequality.

Expanding the number of well-designed electives is an important step in helping students complete degree requirements more efficiently. - Evaluate real-world cases to spot patterns in how justice is applied—or avoided.
- 5. Build strong arguments and policy ideas for holding powerful offenders accountable.
- 6. Connect white collar crime to broader issues like inequality, regulation, and public trust.

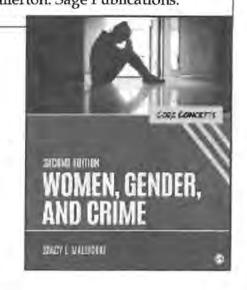

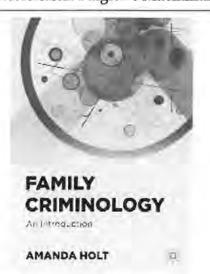

INTRODUCTION: This course provides a comprehensive introduction to the principles, rules, and procedures governing criminal evidence in the United States legal system. Emphasizing both theory and application, the course examines how evidence is gathered, analyzed, and used at various stages of a criminal trial. Students will explore foundational concepts such as the burden of proof, admissibility standards, and the roles of judges, juries, and attorneys in evaluating evidence. The course will cover both direct and circumstantial evidence, as well as key issues related to witness testimony, hearsay, privileges, and constitutional protections under the Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth Amendments. Special attention will be given to how evolving case law and the Federal Rules of Evidence influence trial strategy and the rights of the accused.

Throughout the semester, students will analyze landmark court decisions and practical case scenarios to better understand how evidence affects real-world criminal prosecutions. Topics include the exclusionary rule, the confrontation clause, chain of custody, scientific and digital evidence, and rules pertaining to search and seizure. Students will also examine the balance between individual rights and the public interest in effective law enforcement. By the end of the course, students will be able to identify, interpret, and critique evidentiary issues from both legal and sociological perspectives. This course is cross-listed with Criminal Justice and Sociology and is designed for students interested in law, policing, legal studies, and the broader justice system.

OBJECTIVES:

- Define and accurately use key terms related to criminal evidence, including hearsay, admissibility, relevance, and chain of custody.
- Identify and describe the constitutional protections that shape evidentiary rules, particularly the Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth Amendments.
- Compare and contrast different types of evidence (direct, circumstantial, physical, testimonial, and scientific) and explain their relevance in trial proceedings.
- Apply the Federal Rules of Evidence to hypothetical criminal cases, determining whether evidence would be admitted or excluded.
- Analyze the use and limits of hearsay evidence, including major exceptions and their constitutional
 implications.
- Explain the role and function of witness testimony, including competency, credibility, and privileges
 that may restrict testimony.
- Evaluate case scenarios to determine whether the exclusionary rule or the fruit of the poisonous tree doctrine applies.
- Interpret and critique key appellate decisions involving criminal evidence, using legal reasoning to support a position.
- Describe how social factors can influence the collection, interpretation, and presentation of evidence.

 Assess how criminal evidentiary practices reflect and reinforce broader social structures, norms, and inequalities in the justice system.

REQUIRED TEXTS:

The books will be available on Blackboard.

- Other readings will be assigned as the course goes along. These will be made available through Blackboard.

REQUIREMENTS:

Online Tests (155 points total): You will take several online tests on the assigned chapters via Blackboard. Once a test closes, it won't be available again until the designated make-up weekend.

Online Activities (125 points total): Online activities will be assigned on Blackboard, due on select days. After the deadline, these activities won't be accessible again until the make-up weekend. 20 points will be deducted from your total points for each activity your will.

Reading Quizzes (170 points total): Given the seminar's format, it's crucial that you stay updated with the readings. To ensure this, daily quizzes will be conducted at the beginning of each class to assess your engagement with the material. These quizzes cannot be retaken for any reason. Your two lowest quiz scores will be dropped. Missing five quizzes will result in your removal from the class.

Midterm and Final (360 points total): Students will take two exams in this course. The dates for these are on the schedule below. The midterm is worth 170 points and the final is worth 190 points for a total of 360 possible points. Due to the nature of the course, the final will be cumulative. Exams will consist of question from the readings, videos, lectures, and class discussions.

<u>Missed exams</u>—Students who miss the midterm will be permitted to make-up that exam only with a documented, verifiable excuse for missing the exam. Furthermore, all make-up exams will be offered only on the final day listed on the course schedule. This means that if you miss the exam for legitimate reasons (sleeping through your alarm is not a legitimate reason), you will have to wait to complete your missed exam until after you take the final during the scheduled final time.

Participation (90 points): Active participation is essential for the smooth flow of the class. It's expected that everyone will come prepared, having completed the readings and ready to engage. Lack of attendance or participation will lead to point deductions.

Email: I will disseminate class-related information via email. It's your responsibility to regularly check your email to stay updated. For this course, I will communicate through your official university email account. SOC/CJ 3223 Cybercrimes

An examination of cybercrime including, but not limited to, the types, historical background, theoretical perspectives, measurement, and law enforcement of cybercrime.

SOC/CJ 4073 Criminal Law

This course covers the substantive foundations of criminal law in the United States including legal theory, statutory interpretation, and real-world case analysis. Particular attention is given to crimes against persons, property, public order, and the state. This course emphasizes both historical and contemporary legal reasoning, with a focus on how criminal law reflects broader social values and constitutional constraints. This course is designed for students in both Criminal Justice and Sociology and is suitable for those considering careers in law, public policy, or justice-related fields.

SOC/CJ 4303 Criminal Evidence

A comprehensive introduction to the principles, rules, and procedures governing criminal evidence in the United States legal system. Emphasizing both theory and application, the course examines how evidence is gathered, analyzed, and used at various stages of a criminal trial. Topics cover include the burden of proof, admissibility standards, and the roles of judges, juries, and attorneys in evaluating evidence. Special attention will be given to how evolving case law and the Federal Rules of Evidence influence trial strategy and the rights of the accused. By the end of the course, students will be able to identify, interpret, and critique evidentiary issues from both legal and sociological perspectives. This course is designed for students in both Criminal Justice and Sociology and is suitable for those considering careers in law, public policy, or justice-related fields.

Course Objectives

The purpose of this course is to provide a broad overview of the field of evolutionary psychology. This course has two primary objectives:

- To introduce you to classic and contemporary theory and research in the field of evolutionary
 psychology. Evolutionary psychology is the scientific study of human nature dedicated to
 discovering and understanding the psychological adaptations that evolved to solve ancestral
 survival and reproductive problems. We explore the adaptive problems of and evolved
 solutions to survival, long-term mating, short-term mating, parenting, kinship, cooperation,
 aggression and warfare, conflict between the sexes, status, prestige, and social dominance.
- 2. To foster the development of critical thinking skills. You will achieve this through an emphasis on and application of the scientific method. I want you to be curious and thoughtful about what you read and develop a healthy skepticism of theories without adequate scientific support. These critical thinking principles serve as a framework throughout the course to help you evaluate theories and claims. At the end of this course, you should be able to think critically about psychological claims that you read about or see on the news or in magazines.

Required Textbook

Buss, D. M. (2019). Evolutionary psychology: The new science of the mind (6th ed). Pearson.

While you may be successful in this course using the previous edition of the textbook, you are responsible for the information presented in the current edition. Thus, if you choose to use the previous edition, please note that you are doing so at your own risk.

With that said, former students have been successful in this course using the previous edition of the textbook. Thus, if the previous edition is significantly less expensive, you may choose to purchase that edition.

Blackboard and Email

I post all course materials on Blackboard. I also send emails with announcements and reminders about the class. It is imperative that you check your ATU email account and Blackboard at least once a day. You are responsible for all material sent from me via email or posted on Blackboard. Failure to check your email or Blackboard is not a valid excuse.

You must complete the Federal Attendance Module on Blackboard to remain enrolled in this course. The registrar will drop you from the course if you do not complete the attendance module by Wednesday, August 31 at 11:59 pm. Please complete this module ASAP.

Exams (560 Points)

There are five exams offered in this class. There are four unit exams and a cumulative final exam during final exam week. Each unit exam is 50 multiple choice questions worth 2 points each for a total of 100 points per unit exam. The cumulative final exam is 80 multiple choice questions worth 2 points each for a total of 160 points. The dates for each exam are listed at the end of this syllabus.

I replace your lowest unit exam grade with your second lowest unit exam grade. The cumulative final exam is mandatory and cannot be replaced.

- Example 1: 70, 80, 90, 100 becomes 80, 80, 90, 100
- Example 2: 0, 80, 90, 100 becomes 80, 80, 90, 100
- Example 3: 80, 80, 90, 100 stays 80, 80, 90, 100
- Example 4: 0, 0, 90, 100 stays 0, 0, 90, 100

Because I replace your lowest unit exam grade, there are no makeup exams offered in this class except for university approved reasons communicated to me prior to the exam. These reasons include documented illness, deaths in the family and other documented crises, call to active military duty or jury duty, religious holy days, and official University activities. Otherwise, missing a unit exam will result in a zero and will be replaced by your second lowest unit exam grade.

If you are eligible for a makeup exam, you must complete the makeup exam within a week of the missed exam. Unless I approve an extension for extenuating circumstances, failure to complete the makeup exam within a week of the missed exam results in a zero and will be replaced by your second lowest unit exam grade.

Reading Quizzes (120 Points)

There are 13 reading quizzes offered in this class on Blackboard. Each quiz is 10 multiple choice questions worth 1 point each for a total of 10 points per quiz. However, I drop your lowest quiz grade so only your 12 highest quiz grades count toward your final grade. Thus, quizzes comprise 120 total points toward your final grade.

These quizzes are open book and untimed. You may take each quiz as many times as you want before the deadline passes. Only your highest graded quiz attempt counts toward your final grade. However, each quiz attempt will be different because quiz questions come from a larger pool of questions. Thus, the quiz you take during one attempt will not be the exact same quiz you take during another attempt.

The due dates for quizzes are listed at the end of this syllabus. You must complete these quizzes by 11:59 pm on the due date listed or you will receive a zero for that quiz. Because I drop your lowest quiz grade, there are absolutely no exceptions to this rule.

Critical Annotations (120 Points)

For this assignment, you will choose three journal articles from the list on Blackboard to read, summarize, and critique. I have posted instructions, the journal articles, a rubric, APA formatting guidelines, and a sample critical annotation on Blackboard. The critical annotations are worth 120 points towards your final grade. You must submit your critical annotations to Blackboard by Tuesday, October 18 at 11:59 pm. Critical annotations will receive a 10% reduction in grade for every 24 hours that they are late, including weekends.

Grades

There are 800 possible points in this class. Contrary to popular belief, you do not begin this class with an A and lose points throughout the semester. Rather, you begin this class with a zero and earn points toward achieving the desired letter grade. The table below depicts the number of points you must earn for each letter grade. These cutoffs already include rounding (e.g., $\geq 89.5\% = A$).

What impact will the change have on staffing, on other programs and space allocation? Negligible. The impact on staffing is that one sociology faculty will oversee the internship and the capstone in the spring. This will not interfere with other course offerings or other programs. There should be no changes to space allocation.

The program change supports the university's mission by enhancing students' career readiness through employer connections, hands-on experience, and skill development. It also fosters civic engagement by encouraging students to become active, contributing members of their communities.

 - 1. How will the program change impact learning for students enrolled in this program? Offering students the option to taken an internship, choice of methods courses, and a careers educational course course enhances learning through meaningful experiential and career oriented education.
 - Provide an example or examples of student learning assessment evidence which supports the changes in the program. In assessment of a spring 2025 interdisciplinary, project-based learning course, ATU students overwhelmingly reported that the community engagement component of the course was valuable and wanted. Ninetyfive percent of the respondents (N=23) agreed or strongly agreed that the community engagement component helped them to see the application of their college education and that more courses should include a community engagement component. Over 90% of the respondents agreed or strongly agreed that the community engagement component helped them develop such skills as working in teams, communication, organization, and problem-solving.
- b. How does this program fit in the current state of the discipline? Include Arkansas institutional comparisons. If Arkansas educational institutions do not have the course or program provide comparative examples from regional educational institutions. The addition of an internship course, methods choices and career course reflect a broader trend within the sociology discipline emphasizing applied learning and career readiness. The American Sociological Association (ASA) encourages programs to integrate experiential learning opportunities, including internships, to help students bridge course material with work and graduate school experiences. Within Arkansas, peer institutions, such as the University of Central Arkansas and Arkansas State University, have already moved toward the inclusion of internships into their sociology curricula.

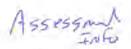

The proposed AB2M program partners the Bachelor of Arts in Psychology undergraduate degree with the Master of Science in Counseling – Rehabilitation Counseling Option and Clinical Mental Health Option. Students in this accelerated program can substitute up to 12 hours of graduate level CNSL courses for undergraduate Elective courses in the senior fall and spring terms.

CNSL 5003: Medical and Psychosocial Aspects of Disability for 3 hours of 3000-4000 level Elective;

CNSL 5223: Ethics and Professional Development for 3 hours of 3000-4000 level Elective;

CNSL 5233: Diversity and Inclusion in Human Service Settings for 3 hours of 3000-4000 level Elective; and

CNSL 5253: Psychopathology for 3 hours of 3000-4000 level Elective.

Students will get an example of what graduate course work will look like while still being an undergraduate student. Due to the admissions process, we will only be accepting students who have the potential to do well in graduate work so they will be successful.

Students will be held to the same assessment plan that the MS in Counseling program has adopted. We follow the curriculum guidelines of our future hope of being CACREP accredited as well as following the guidance of the Arkansas Board of Examiners in Counseling (LPC) and the Commission of Certified Rehabilitation Counselors (CRCC) to ensure our students will become licensed and/or certified counselors upon graduation.

This will be a huge recruitment and retention tool for both the Psychology program and the Masters in Counseling program.

Course Description: An investigation of political geography, with a focus on the spatial dimensions of politics in the United States.

Required Text: None, but you are required to keep up with all Blackboard readings. The supplementary readings, along with maps, discussions, notes, and multimedia examples serve as the course textbook.

Course Rationale: This upper-division course is a thematic-based study of political geography, with a heavy emphasis on the history, trends, and spatial dimensions of political geography in the United States.

As our Anthropology and Geography major has grown, we have had several students work as interns in community organizations, such as the Russellville city government. This course, "Geography Internship", with a variable set of hours from 1 to 4, allows students to earn course credit for internship work. The structure and description of this course also mirror existing internship courses in HIST and POLS.

Course Description: A supervised placement in a geography-related organization under the joint professional guidance of the organization and a faculty member. Emphasis will be placed on real-world experiential learning. Students are required to complete a comprehensive report and a minimum number of internship-related hours, to be determined by the instructor.

Course Note: May be taken for 1, 2, 3, or 4 hours of credit One credit hour is equivalent to 10 internship clock hours.

Course Information

This undergraduate research course focuses on a valuable internship-type opportunity with the Russellville Planning & Development Office (https://www.russellvillearkansas.org/166/Planning-Development). The duties and responsibilities encountered during this course will allow enrolled students to gain first-hand knowledge of urban planning outside of the traditional classroom.

Students will work (unpaid) with the Russellville Planning & Development Office around 8-10 hours per week (with occasional evening public meeting hours as needed) under the supervision of the Russellville "City Planner" (Sara Jondahl) and the associate "Planner I" (Victoria Marchant). Victoria Marchant (479-968-1002) also serves the main contact for this program. This course is a pilot program for a more formal internship that could occur between ATU and the City of Russellville in 2022 and beyond.

Learning Objectives: Throughout this internship course experience, students will:

- Apply geographic knowledge and skills in a professional setting.
- Communicate and collaborate effectively in a workplace environment.
- Connect academic learning with real-world geographic practice.
- Evaluate how geographic methods contribute to organizational goals.
- Complete and reflect on internship experiences in a final report.

Student Responsibilities

Student responsibilities during this program may include: compliance checks for city ordinance petitions (including zoning, permit requests, street closing requests, etc.), scheduling work with the Planning Commission and Board of Adjustment, communication to applicants of ordinance submissions, preparation of a Monthly

Recommendation Report for the City Council Agenda, maintenance of Master Zoning Code Manual/Land Subdivision and Development Code Manual, and other duties as requested.

At the end of this course, the student will prepare a summary report for the instructor (Dr. Patrick Hagge) relating their experience to wider connections in urban geography. This workload is equivalent to a 2-hour upper-level course in urban geography.

- International Relations, as a concept, focuses only on the interactions, diplomacy, and politics between the officially recognized countries of the world.
- While studying these relations for 194 U.N. recognized countries (plus several semi-recognized entities, such as Kosovo) is an important component of this course, focusing only on the countries of the world excludes many important actors, such as:
 - Non-state actors (Ex.: terrorist organizations),
 - o Intergovernmental organizations (The United Nations, NATO, etc.),
 - Nongovernmental organizations (The International Red Cross, etc.), and
 - Multinational corporations (Walmart, Huawei, AstraZeneca, etc.)
- World Politics, in contrast, is a broader and more comprehensive term, and includes the examination of all these aforementioned political actors, in addition to the interactions and diplomacy between countries of the world that the term "International Relations" encompasses.
- Additionally, World Politics is seen as the more contemporary term for introducing new students to the global side of political science. International Relations, while still occasionally used, is somewhat dated.

- We want to change the course title to "U.S. Foreign Policy," which is shorter, simpler, and far more commonly used in political science.
 - At institutions of higher education in Arkansas, as well as at peer institutions across the region, they almost universally use this simpler title for their foreign policy course.
 - While the U.S. military is covered in this class, it never has been treated as a co-equal topic in the course that should garner equal billing in the course title.
- We also want to update the Course Description. The current course description
 does not reflect how U.S. foreign policy is taught nowadays, but reflects an
 approach that was more commonplace two decades ago.
 - The 2024 2025 Course Catalog description currently reads: The post World War II environment in which U.S. foreign and military policy functions; emphasis is on the formulation of policy, relationship of foreign policy and domestic affairs, problems of foreign and military policy coordination and control, and the military industrial complex.
 - We would like to modify the course description to read as follows: This course examines the foreign policy and relations of the United States with an emphasis on the post-World War Two environment. This class looks at the global and historical background of U.S. foreign policy and relations, the many institutions that shape foreign policy, important societal influences on foreign policy, and a selection of the major, pressing foreign policy issues.

The entire HPS curriculum committee, along with the input collected from informal departmental discussions, acknowledges the ongoing issues with our upper-level course matrix. For students, the proposed changes continue the multi-year revision of the BA in Anthropology and Geography, which is a process shaped by student feedback, such as the 2022 program name change from Cultural and Geospatial Studies.

- Changing the foreign language requirement may affect some language enrollments, though the overall impact is expected to be minimal. Many HPS students already have their language requirement waived, either by earning one or two years of Arkansas high school language credit or due to intermittent language course offerings at ATU. Additionally, students may still choose to take language classes to fulfill General Education requirements.
- 2. The lower-level requirement changes (#2-#5 above) are merely requiring classes for what used to be a choice of classes. As a result, there will be a minimal impact on HIST, GEOG, and PHIL staffing. Adding the HIST, GEOG, and PHIL upper-level electives will have also minimal impact on space allocation or staffing. Only one 3-hour class requirement of each discipline is added, and many PHIL and GEOG courses are taught online.

Currently, many students may take random 3000- or 4000-

level courses simply to meet Arkansas' 40-hour upper-level requirement. Offering more upper-level courses relevant to the BA in Political Science will help students develop skills that are more directly aligned with the job market. In particular, critical thinking skills offered by lower-level Philosophy courses will be even more in-demand given the rise of AI over the next decade.

 The entire HPS curriculum committee, along with the input collected from informal discussions throughout the department, recognizes this issue with our upper-level course matrix.

At Arkansas Tech, interdisciplinary cooperation is common, given the interdisciplinary nature of the Department of History and Political Science (formerly the Department of Social Sciences and Philosophy). Likewise, the current BA in Political Science was formerly part of a BA in History and Political Science degree, and the current BA in Social Studies Education has course requirements in history, political science, and geography.

Across Arkansas, Political Science has broader curriculum connections with other social sciences:

-University of Arkansas' BA in Political Science requires
Philosophy electives as one of two mandatory tracks

-University of Arkansas' BA in Political Science offers a wider POLS curriculum, including history- and geography- focused courses about Germany (PLSC494H3), China (PLSC 45303), and the US South (PLSC 43303)

-UA Fort Smith's (recently closed) BA in Political Science required upper-level hours towards a second degree

-UCA's "Upper Division Core", similar to a mini-upper-division GenEd, requires all UCA students to complete a handful of upper-division courses. As noted by UCA, "Some students will have to go outside of their majors to satisfy the UD Core. This is a good thing. AOL Plan for the School of Business

The mission statement of the School of Business is considered and revised every five years. The mission statement is used to inform the selection of goals for the undergraduate and graduate programs. When the mission statement is updated, the alignment between mission statement/goals/objectives is reaffirmed. Tables 1 and 2 show the alignment of the mission statement to program goals and program objectives for the undergraduate and MBA programs respectively.

The objectives are mapped to appropriate courses in the undergraduate and graduate programs. Tables 3 and 4 show a map of program objectives to courses for the undergraduate and MBA programs. These objectives are cyclically measured both directly and indirectly. For both the undergraduate and graduate programs, analytic rubrics are applied to the objectives of written communication, oral communication, ethical decision making, technology/data use once every two years by faculty groups who have been assigned a particular objective. Each semester the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning will contact the instructor of the courses scheduled to provide assessment data. The instructors are given a copy of the rubric that will be used and are asked to provide copies of student artifacts on which the rubrics can be applied by the end of the semester. Generally, the student artifacts used are assignments (papers or projects), in the case of oral communication, presentations are recorded. The artifacts are then distributed to the faculty members of the corresponding program learning objective groups (Table 5 details faculty objective group membership). The Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning coordinates the use of the rubrics, if needed, calling a meeting to discuss how the rubric will be applied. The Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning collects the scores, summarizes the data, and provides reports made available to all faculty through a Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Blackboard shell and to students via summary reports outside the School Business office. Further, the results are presented and discussed at Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Committee meetings (this committee meets a minimum of two times a semester). If scores are below performance targets, the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning will present the results for discussion with the Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Committee, faculty learning objective group, and impacted instructors for appropriate action to be taken. All faculty are invited to be involved in acting on assessment data. However, the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning ensures the appropriate faculty are involved in particular improvement discussions.

Foundational business knowledge and advanced field knowledge are tested through a senior or MBA exam a minimum of once a year. These exams are administered by the instructor of the capstone course and the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning. A survey of undergraduate and graduate students is administered near the end of their final semester as an indirect measure. This survey is administered by the Director of Student Engagement. Similar to rubric data, the senior exams and survey data are collected and summarized by Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning, made available to all faculty, and used for continuous improvement. Figure 1 shows the AOL continuous improvement cycle, Tables 6 and 7 show (abbreviated) assessment schedules (a more complete schedule is shown in Table 9). The AOL process is managed and implemented by the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning and by the Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Committee (CALC). The Curriculum and Assurance of Learning is tasked with maintaining and improving the AOL process itself, including the analytic rubrics used, the Senior and MBA exams, the discipline specific exams, and indirect survey data. However, all faculty and students are involved in the AOL process. Table 8 details the AOL roles and responsibilities for the School of Business.

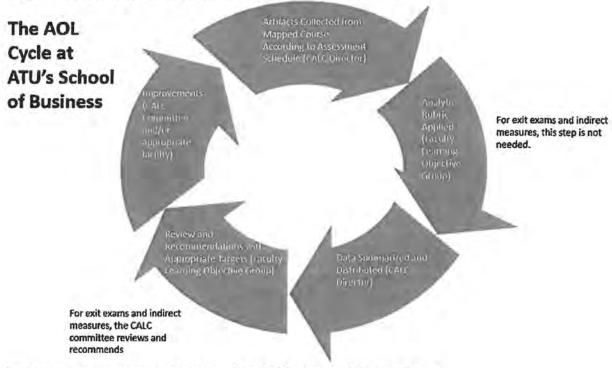

AOL Plan for the School of Business

The mission statement of the School of Business is considered and revised every five years. The mission statement is used to inform the selection of goals for the undergraduate and graduate programs. When the mission statement is updated, the alignment between mission statement/goals/objectives is reaffirmed. Tables 1 and 2 show the alignment of the mission statement to program goals and program objectives for the undergraduate and MBA programs respectively.

The objectives are mapped to appropriate courses in the undergraduate and graduate programs. Tables 3 and 4 show a map of program objectives to courses for the undergraduate and MBA programs. These objectives are cyclically measured both directly and indirectly. For both the undergraduate and graduate programs, analytic rubrics are applied to the objectives of written communication, oral communication, ethical decision making, technology/data use once every two years by faculty groups who have been assigned a particular objective. Each semester the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning will contact the instructor of the courses scheduled to provide assessment data. The instructors are given a copy of the rubric that will be used and are asked to provide copies of student artifacts on which the rubrics can be applied by the end of the semester. Generally, the student artifacts used are assignments (papers or projects), in the case of oral communication, presentations are recorded. The artifacts are then distributed to the faculty members of the corresponding program learning objective groups (Table 5 details faculty objective group membership). The Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning coordinates the use of the rubrics, if needed, calling a meeting to discuss how the rubric will be applied. The Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning collects the scores, summarizes the data, and provides reports made available to all faculty through a Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Blackboard shell and to students via summary reports outside the School Business office. Further, the results are presented and discussed at Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Committee meetings (this committee meets a minimum of two times a semester). If scores are below performance targets, the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning will present the results for discussion with the Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Committee, faculty learning objective group, and impacted instructors for appropriate action to be taken. All faculty are invited to be involved in acting on assessment data. However, the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning ensures the appropriate faculty are involved in particular improvement discussions.

Foundational business knowledge and advanced field knowledge are tested through a senior or MBA exam a minimum of once a year. These exams are administered by the instructor of the capstone course and the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning, A survey of undergraduate and graduate students is administered near the end of their final semester as an indirect measure. This survey is administered by the Director of Student Engagement. Similar to rubric data, the senior exams and survey data are collected and summarized by Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning, made available to all faculty, and used for continuous improvement. Figure 1 shows the AOL continuous improvement cycle, Tables 6 and 7 show (abbreviated) assessment schedules (a more complete schedule is shown in Table 9). The AOL process is managed and implemented by the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning and by the Curriculum and Assurance of Learning committee (CALC). The Curriculum and Assurance of Learning is tasked with maintaining and improving the AOL process itself, including the analytic rubrics used, the Senior and MBA exams, the discipline specific exams, and indirect survey data. However, all faculty and students are involved in the AOL process. Table 8 details the AOL roles and responsibilities for the School of Business.

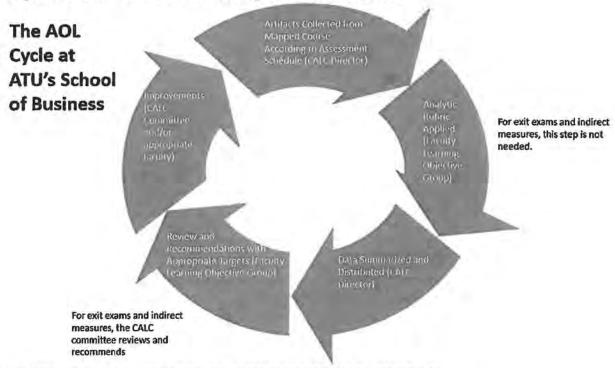

 In an attempt to improve retention and introduce students to key program learning goals earlier in the curriculum, BUAD 1111 Introduction to Business is being changed to BUAD 1113, a three-hour course. In addition, BDA 3023 data visualization will be added as a

required BDA course. To make room for these changes two courses are being moved from required courses to approved electives. The accelerated MBA path from BDA is also being made more flexible by removing specific courses from the replacement list. The remaining changes clean up the approved elective lists, and move courses in the matrix to support these changes. These proposed changes improve the BDA curriculum by adding key advanced BDA knowledge, while given students more flexibility in approved electives.

Provide an example or examples of student learning assessment evidence which supports the changes in the program.

In the 2024/2025 academic year, the BDA curriculum was reviewed (we have a five-year cycle where each program we offered that is AACSB accredited is reviewed). Data collected from alumni surveys indicated more data visualization is needed as a requirement in the BDA curriculum; this also is supported by comparing curriculum at other institutions offering a data analytics degree. Changing this course to from a sophomore to junior level course will allow it to be made a BDA requirement and school of business elective that may be desirable to many other programs. Assessment data from "Advanced Knowledge in Business Data Analytics" has also been lower than desired, this change will allow us to add more upper level required data analytics knowledge into the curriculum.

AOL Plan for the School of Business

The mission statement of the School of Business is considered and revised every five years. The mission statement is used to inform the selection of goals for the undergraduate and graduate programs. When the mission statement is updated, the alignment between mission statement/goals/objectives is reaffirmed. Tables 1 and 2 show the alignment of the mission statement to program goals and program objectives for the undergraduate and MBA programs respectively.

The objectives are mapped to appropriate courses in the undergraduate and graduate programs. Tables 3 and 4 show a map of program objectives to courses for the undergraduate and MBA programs. These objectives are cyclically measured both directly and indirectly. For both the undergraduate and graduate programs, analytic rubrics are applied to the objectives of written communication, oral communication, ethical decision making, technology/data use once every two years by faculty groups who have been assigned a particular objective. Each semester the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning will contact the instructor of the courses scheduled to provide assessment data. The instructors are given a copy of the rubric that will be used and are asked to provide copies of student artifacts on which the rubrics can be applied by the end of the semester. Generally, the student artifacts used are assignments (papers or projects), in the case of oral communication, presentations are recorded. The artifacts are then distributed to the faculty members of the corresponding program learning objective groups (Table 5 details faculty objective group membership). The Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning coordinates the use of the rubrics, if needed, calling a meeting to discuss how the rubric will be applied. The Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning collects the scores, summarizes the data, and provides reports made available to all faculty through a Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Blackboard shell and to students via summary reports outside the School Business office. Further, the results are presented and discussed at Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Committee meetings (this committee meets a minimum of two times a semester). If scores are below performance targets, the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning will present the results for discussion with the Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Committee, faculty learning objective group, and impacted instructors for appropriate action to be taken. All faculty are invited to be involved in acting on assessment data. However, the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning ensures the appropriate faculty are involved in particular improvement discussions.

Foundational business knowledge and advanced field knowledge are tested through a senior or MBA exam a minimum of once a year. These exams are administered by the instructor of the capstone course and the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning. A survey of undergraduate and graduate students is administered near the end of their final semester as an indirect measure. This survey is administered by the Director of Student Engagement. Similar to rubric data, the senior exams and survey data are collected and summarized by Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning, made available to all faculty, and used for continuous improvement. Figure 1 shows the AOL continuous improvement cycle, Tables 6 and 7 show (abbreviated) assessment schedules (a more complete schedule is shown in Table 9). The AOL process is managed and implemented by the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning and by the Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Committee (CALC). The Curriculum and Assurance of Learning is tasked with maintaining and improving the AOL process itself, including the analytic rubrics used, the Senior and MBA exams, the discipline specific exams, and indirect survey data. However, all faculty and students are involved in the AOL process. Table 8 details the AOL roles and responsibilities for the School of Business.

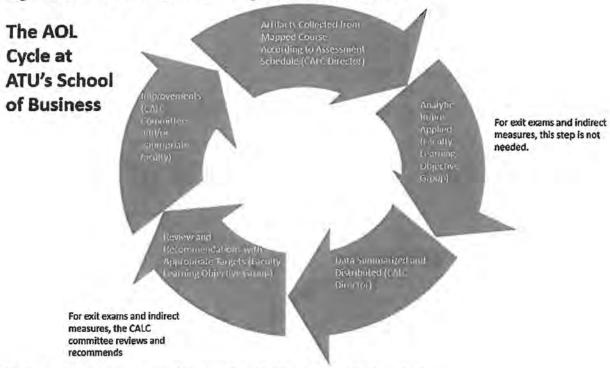

AOL Plan for the School of Business

The mission statement of the School of Business is considered and revised every five years. The mission statement is used to inform the selection of goals for the undergraduate and graduate programs. When the mission statement is updated, the alignment between mission statement/goals/objectives is reaffirmed. Tables 1 and 2 show the alignment of the mission statement to program goals and program objectives for the undergraduate and MBA programs respectively.

The objectives are mapped to appropriate courses in the undergraduate and graduate programs. Tables 3 and 4 show a map of program objectives to courses for the undergraduate and MBA programs. These objectives are cyclically measured both directly and indirectly. For both the undergraduate and graduate programs, analytic rubrics are applied to the objectives of written communication, oral communication, ethical decision making, technology/data use once every two years by faculty groups who have been assigned a particular objective. Each semester the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning will contact the instructor of the courses scheduled to provide assessment data. The instructors are given a copy of the rubric that will be used and are asked to provide copies of student artifacts on which the rubrics can be applied by the end of the semester. Generally, the student artifacts used are assignments (papers or projects), in the case of oral communication, presentations are recorded. The artifacts are then distributed to the faculty members of the corresponding program learning objective groups (Table 5 details faculty objective group membership). The Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning coordinates the use of the rubrics, if needed, calling a meeting to discuss how the rubric will be applied. The Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning collects the scores, summarizes the data, and provides reports made available to all faculty through a Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Blackboard shell and to students via summary reports outside the School Business office. Further, the results are presented and discussed at Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Committee meetings (this committee meets a minimum of two times a semester). If scores are below performance targets, the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning will present the results for discussion with the Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Committee, faculty learning objective group, and impacted instructors for appropriate action to be taken. All faculty are invited to be involved in acting on assessment data. However, the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning ensures the appropriate faculty are involved in particular improvement discussions.

Foundational business knowledge and advanced field knowledge are tested through a senior or MBA exam a minimum of once a year. These exams are administered by the instructor of the capstone course and the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning. A survey of undergraduate and graduate students is administered near the end of their final semester as an indirect measure. This survey is administered by the Director of Student Engagement. Similar to rubric data, the senior exams and survey data are collected and summarized by Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning, made available to all faculty, and used for continuous improvement. Figure 1 shows the AOL continuous improvement cycle, Tables 6 and 7 show (abbreviated) assessment schedules (a more complete schedule is shown in Table 9). The AOL process is managed and implemented by the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning and by the Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Committee (CALC). The Curriculum and Assurance of Learning is tasked with maintaining and improving the AOL process itself, including the analytic rubrics used, the Senior and MBA exams, the discipline specific exams, and indirect survey data. However, all faculty and students are involved in the AOL process. Table 8 details the AOL roles and responsibilities for the School of Business.

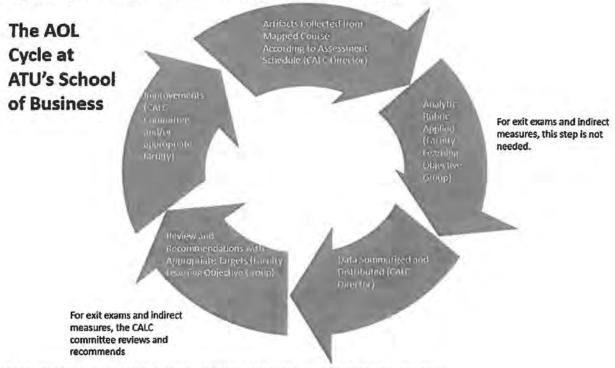

AOL Plan for the School of Business

The mission statement of the School of Business is considered and revised every five years. The mission statement is used to inform the selection of goals for the undergraduate and graduate programs. When the mission statement is updated, the alignment between mission statement/goals/objectives is reaffirmed. Tables 1 and 2 show the alignment of the mission statement to program goals and program objectives for the undergraduate and MBA programs respectively.

The objectives are mapped to appropriate courses in the undergraduate and graduate programs. Tables 3 and 4 show a map of program objectives to courses for the undergraduate and MBA programs. These objectives are cyclically measured both directly and indirectly. For both the undergraduate and graduate programs, analytic rubrics are applied to the objectives of written communication, oral communication, ethical decision making, technology/data use once every two years by faculty groups who have been assigned a particular objective. Each semester the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning will contact the instructor of the courses scheduled to provide assessment data. The instructors are given a copy of the rubric that will be used and are asked to provide copies of student artifacts on which the rubrics can be applied by the end of the semester. Generally, the student artifacts used are assignments (papers or projects), in the case of oral communication, presentations are recorded. The artifacts are then distributed to the faculty members of the corresponding program learning objective groups (Table 5 details faculty objective group membership). The Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning coordinates the use of the rubrics, if needed, calling a meeting to discuss how the rubric will be applied. The Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning collects the scores, summarizes the data, and provides reports made available to all faculty through a Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Blackboard shell and to students via summary reports outside the School Business office. Further, the results are presented and discussed at Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Committee meetings (this committee meets a minimum of two times a semester). If scores are below performance targets, the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning will present the results for discussion with the Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Committee, faculty learning objective group, and impacted instructors for appropriate action to be taken. All faculty are invited to be involved in acting on assessment data. However, the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning ensures the appropriate faculty are involved in particular improvement discussions.

Foundational business knowledge and advanced field knowledge are tested through a senior or MBA exam a minimum of once a year. These exams are administered by the instructor of the capstone course and the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning. A survey of undergraduate and graduate students is administered near the end of their final semester as an indirect measure. This survey is administered by the Director of Student Engagement. Similar to rubric data, the senior exams and survey data are collected and summarized by Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning, made available to all faculty, and used for continuous improvement. Figure 1 shows the AOL continuous improvement cycle, Tables 6 and 7 show (abbreviated) assessment schedules (a more complete schedule is shown in Table 9). The AOL process is managed and implemented by the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning and by the Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Committee (CALC). The Curriculum and Assurance of Learning is tasked with maintaining and improving the AOL process itself, including the analytic rubrics used, the Senior and MBA exams, the discipline specific exams, and indirect survey data. However, all faculty and students are involved in the AOL process. Table 8 details the AOL roles and responsibilities for the School of Business.

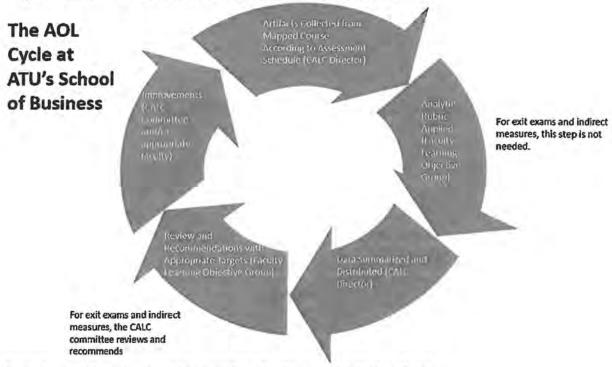

AOL Plan for the School of Business

The mission statement of the School of Business is considered and revised every five years. The mission statement is used to inform the selection of goals for the undergraduate and graduate programs. When the mission statement is updated, the alignment between mission statement/goals/objectives is reaffirmed. Tables 1 and 2 show the alignment of the mission statement to program goals and program objectives for the undergraduate and MBA programs respectively.

The objectives are mapped to appropriate courses in the undergraduate and graduate programs. Tables 3 and 4 show a map of program objectives to courses for the undergraduate and MBA programs. These objectives are cyclically measured both directly and indirectly. For both the undergraduate and graduate programs, analytic rubrics are applied to the objectives of written communication, oral communication, ethical decision making, technology/data use once every two years by faculty groups who have been assigned a particular objective. Each semester the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning will contact the instructor of the courses scheduled to provide assessment data. The instructors are given a copy of the rubric that will be used and are asked to provide copies of student artifacts on which the rubrics can be applied by the end of the semester. Generally, the student artifacts used are assignments (papers or projects), in the case of oral communication, presentations are recorded. The artifacts are then distributed to the faculty members of the corresponding program learning objective groups (Table 5 details faculty objective group membership). The Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning coordinates the use of the rubrics, if needed, calling a meeting to discuss how the rubric will be applied. The Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning collects the scores, summarizes the data, and provides reports made available to all faculty through a Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Blackboard shell and to students via summary reports outside the School Business office. Further, the results are presented and discussed at Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Committee meetings (this committee meets a minimum of two times a semester). If scores are below performance targets, the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning will present the results for discussion with the Curriculum and Assurance of Learning Committee, faculty learning objective group, and impacted instructors for appropriate action to be taken. All faculty are invited to be involved in acting on assessment data. However, the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning ensures the appropriate faculty are involved in particular improvement discussions.

Foundational business knowledge and advanced field knowledge are tested through a senior or MBA exam a minimum of once a year. These exams are administered by the instructor of the capstone course and the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning. A survey of undergraduate and graduate students is administered near the end of their final semester as an indirect measure. This survey is administered by the Director of Student Engagement. Similar to rubric data, the senior exams and survey data are collected and summarized by Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning, made available to all faculty, and used for continuous improvement. Figure 1 shows the AOL continuous improvement cycle, Tables 6 and 7 show (abbreviated) assessment schedules (a more complete schedule is shown in Table 9). The AOL process is managed and implemented by the Director of Curriculum and Assurance of Learning and by the Curriculum and Assurance of Learning is tasked with maintaining and improving the AOL process itself, including the analytic rubrics used, the Senior and MBA exams, the discipline specific exams, and indirect survey data. However, all faculty and students are involved in the AOL process. Table 8 details the AOL roles and responsibilities for the School of Business.

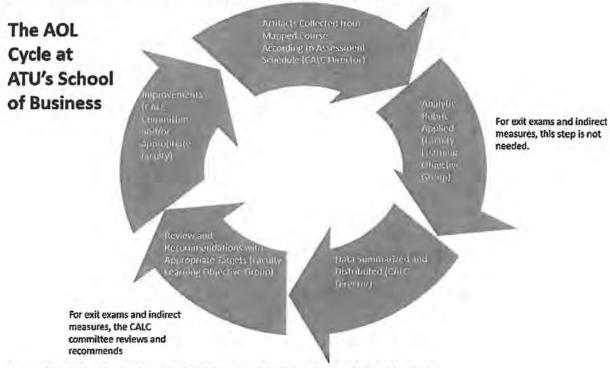

Since the secondary Mathematics Education Program no longer exists, MATH 3771 and MATH 4703 will no longer be offered. Dr. Shojaei will continue to offer MATH 3703 every other fall. SPED 3153 is a course that is already offered.

Students have expressed concern about working with students with exceptionalities, especially in Math, where the content is not as subjective. Adding this course will enable our students to reach their greatest potential.

In addition, employers often seek out students who have undertaken an internship, giving them preference in hiring decisions due to this on-the-job type training. The Department and the Norman Career Center regularly field calls from local and

regional companies seeking to hire engineering student interns. There is currently a high demand for these students.

Previously, the Department has enrolled some students who were working in intern positions in a special problems class or the MCEG 3663 internship course. The intent with this proposal is to formalize the process, set forth clear, uniform conditions for what does and does not constitute an internship that receives academic credit, and to allow for a standard method for reflecting this credit on student's transcripts as an Electrical Engineering course. It is proposed that students who meet the eligibility criteria (set forth in the attached syllabus) be allowed to use internship credits to fulfill one required 3 credit hour Engineering Elective in the BSEE or BSCMPE curricula. As noted above, some students have already taken advantage of this using the MCEG 3663 internship class credit as an engineering elective. The creation of this class will allow students the opportunity to receive internship credit within the Electrical Engineering program.

A work evaluation from the student's direct supervisor is also required for successful completion of the credit. This is a pass/fail course.

I. Policy on absences, cheating, plagiarism, etc.

As the student will not be on campus or under day-to-day supervision/observation of a faculty member, work absences and any instances of improper conduct/behavior are expected to be reflected in the required supervisor report. During the period of the internship, the student will be an employee of the cooperating company and, as such, subject to the companies policies on absenteeism, conduct, etc.

m. Course content

Content of the course will vary depending on the business of the cooperating company and the specific position assigned to the student. The participating student will work on engineering problems/assignments with the cooperating company. Thus, the student will gain experience in day-to-day engineering activities ranging from documentation and quality checks to product design to process design/troubleshooting and many more.

Assignment Completion

Students must complete their assignment within the timeframe specified by the instructor.

Late Work

Work must be received by the due date and time as given by the instructor. If you have not made arrangements with the instructor prior to the due date, late assignments will not be accepted except under special circumstances.

E-Mail Correspondence

In all e-mails to the instructor, list the course number and section number. And, if applicable, list the name or number of the assignment in the "Subject Line" of the e-mail. Also, be sure your name is somewhere on the email and on any attached assignment.

All students must give prompt attention to communications from faculty and staff members of the University. Most communications will be sent to your official Tech e-mail address. University policy dictates that electronic communications to your instructor must be sent from your official Tech e-mail address.

Excessive Unexcused Absences

If, at any time during the semester, you have unexcused absences or fail to complete and submit assignments, you may be referred to the Tech Early Warning Program. If you are unresponsive to contact attempts, you may be dropped from the course by your instructor with an "FE" for excessive absences or non-performance. (Please note being dropped for an FE could result in your removal from the Honors Program.) It is your responsibility to contact the instructor directly when you cannot attend class; however, excused absence is not guaranteed.

Campus policy outlines the dates for dropping a course with a "W". If you have a failing score and do not drop before the stated deadline, you will receive an "F" on your transcript for the course; therefore, it is in your best interest to monitor your status in the course and take advantage of the opportunity to withdraw with a "W" rather than remaining in the course and receiving an "F."

You are responsible for explaining to the instructor the reason for absences due to sickness, accident, or death in the family. The instructor is entitled to request verification. For absences which make it difficult for you to contact the instructor, such as an emergency, you should contact the Student Services Office, Doc Bryan Student Services Center, Room 233, (479-968-0239) to have the instructor notified.

Academic Misconduct

Academic misconduct concerns a student's inappropriate behavior in a class regardless of the class format and delivery. Such behavior includes interacting with the professor and other students in a manner that disrupts the learning environment of a class. Examples include but are not limited to: a) engaging in a discussion with other students that is not beneficial to the class or acceptable to the professor; b) interrupting class unnecessarily; c) attempting to monopolize the professor's time and attention; d) being chronically late to the class; and e) failing to engage in a class in a manner that is required by the professor, such as chronically late submission of assignments. Misconduct also covers verbal or nonverbal

harassment and threats in relation to classes. Student behavior must not infringe on the rights of other students or faculty during a class, including the online environment.

Course, Program, and University policies will be followed in handling academic misconduct.

A student will be notified when his or her conduct is inappropriate. If the student does not respond to the notification and/or the inappropriate conduct continues, the student will be removed from the classroom and/or Blackboard. If the student subsequently engages in misconduct, the student will be removed from the course. If the student continues to engage in misconduct, he or she may be removed from the program entirely; and the professor may begin university procedures for removal from the university.

Please note - In egregious cases of misconduct, such as verbal or written abuse or threats, the student may immediately be removed from the classroom and/or Blackboard, from the course, and from the program entirely. In such cases, the professor may begin university procedures for removal from the university.

Academic Dishonesty

Academic dishonesty refers to the various categories of cheating and plagiarism in a class, regardless of the class format and delivery.

- 1. Cheating on an examination, quiz, or homework assignment involves any of several categories of dishonest activity. Examples include but are not limited to: a) copying from an examination, quiz, or any other assignment of another student; b) utilizing notes, messages, or crib sheets in any format which gives the student extra help on an exam or quiz, and which were not approved by the professor of the class; c) obtaining advance copies of exams or quizzes by any means; d) hiring a substitute to take an exam or bribing any other individual to obtain exam or quiz questions; e) buying term papers or other assignments from the Internet or any other source; and f) using the same paper to fulfill requirements in several classes without the consent of the professors teaching those classes.
- 2. Plagiarism is stealing the ideas or writing of another person and using them as one's own. This includes not only passages, but also sentences and phrases that are incorporated in the student's written or oral work without acknowledgement to the true author. Any assignment, including but not limited to lab work, report, paper, presentation, or discussion board, written by copying or cutting and pasting from the Internet or any other source is plagiarized. Slight modifications in wording do not change the fact the sentence or phrase is plagiarized. Acknowledgment of the source of ideas must be made through a recognized footnoting or citation format. Plagiarism includes recasting the phrase or passage in the student's own words of another's ideas that are not considered common knowledge. Acknowledgement of source must be made in this case as well.

Course, Department, College, and University policies will be followed in handling academic dishonesty.

Students who violate the Code of Academic Integrity (cheating, plagiarism, etc.) face penalties ranging from being required to redo the assignment (i.e., properly cite sources in cases of plagiarism) to failure of the assignment and/or class. The sanction is dependent on the severity of the violation as well as the number of times a student has violated the policy in the class. Egregious or multiple violations may result in additional university level sanctions.

In addition, any student who aids another student in academic dishonesty (e.g., answers or provides a paper or a completed homework assignment to another student for submission) will be treated as also being involved in the dishonesty and appropriate penalties will apply.

Egregious cases of plagiarism (i.e., large sections copied from another source) will result in an automatic "F" for the course. THIS MEANS NO COPYING & PASTING IN ANY ASSIGNMENT.

Professionalism, Communication, & Respect

It is the policy and expectation of the Honors Program that students will conduct themselves in a professional manner that is guided by respect, collegiality, honesty, and ethical behavior in all of their interactions and communication with university faculty, staff, each other, and the community. Purpose and Goals/Learning Outcomes

Course Description:

Students will be introduced to fundamental legal principles for both civil and criminal matters, as well as the structure of the court systems at both the federal and state level. The course will focus on legal issues in business including torts, employment law, intellectual property, basic property law, corporate organizations, bankruptcy, contracts, and commercial transactions.

Program Outcome(s):

The following learning goals guide the program and course outcomes for all BSBA degrees offered at the ATU School of Business:

- Students demonstrate written communication skills in a business context.
- Students demonstrate oral communication skills in a business context.
- · Students use an ethical decision-making framework in a business context.
- Students use technology to support business decisions.
- Students demonstrate the foundation knowledge for conducting business.
- Students will demonstrate an advanced level of knowledge in the field related to their major or advanced certificate

Upon completion of this course students will be able to:

- 1. Differentiate between types of business organizations.
- 2. Identify the primary sources of American law.
- 3. Compare and contrast the difference between criminal law and civil law.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the embedded concepts in the following areas of law:
 Contracts, Torts, Criminal Law, Property Law, Family Law and Employment Law including the public policy and ethical issues relevant to these areas of law.
- 5. Define Bankruptcy and Product Liability.
- 6. Apply basic legal knowledge in everyday life and real-world contexts.

This course contributes to the following program outcomes for the BSBA program:

- Think Critically: In complex, fact-pattern based hypothetical multiple-choice questions in each module, students learn to apply embedded concepts from each area of law to determine the correct answer.
- Develop Ethical Perspectives: In studying each area of law, students learn to balance law and public good using empathy and calling on their developing leadership skills to determine best practices in applying the law to a variety of situations.

Course Requirements

Quizzes: There will be approximately 10 quizzes to be completed. Some will be in-class, others will be on Blackboard. Quizzes will consist primarily of multiple-choice questions. The highest grade earned will be the grade that is recorded. 100 total quiz points possible for the semester. Discussion Questions/Projects: Various discussion questions/projects. 50 points (Points for each will vary).

Exams: There will be four exams plus a final exam. Each is worth 100 points. These exams will consist of multiple choice and short answer questions. The questions will cover content from both the readings and lectures. The final exam will be cumulative. I will drop the lowest of the first four exam scores. Final exam scores are not dropped. 400 total exam points possible.

Extra Credit: Extra credit will not be given on an individual basis. An opportunity to earn extra credit may be offered to the entire class.

<u>Course Description</u>: This is an introductory course on leadership, where students will gain an understanding of the concepts, theories, and best practices regarding effective leadership. In addition, students will focus on understanding self and personal leadership.

Purpose of Course/Class Offering: This three-credit hour course is scheduled to be offered at least once/academic year, typically in the fall semester. Students will be encouraged to explore leadership concepts and integrate those concepts into their learning experiences both in and out of the academic classroom while they are pursuing their undergraduate degree and in their chosen career fields. The course will be recognized as an elective on the student's degree plan and is open to students pursuing all academic majors, however it is a required course for those pursuing the undergraduate leadership studies minor.

Course Objectives: Students will be able:

- To demonstrate how the study, understanding, and practice of leadership has evolved Assessment: Class discussion, Exams
- To identify leadership theories and demonstrate the practical application of each theory Assessment: Class discussion, Exams

GENERAL EDUCATION OUTCOMES AND ASSESSMENT

This course contributes to the Arkansas Tech University General Education mission through development of effective communication skills (Goal 1) and ethical perspectives in diversity, empathy, and leadership (Goal 5). Students will apply various leadership and ethical perspectives to analyze leader actions within the contexts of diversity, empathy, and leadership. To meet general education learning outcomes, students will demonstrate proficiency in the ethical perspectives regarding diversity, empathy, and leadership. Students will also demonstrate proficiency in oral and written communication through presentations of leadership decisions, proposals, and analysis.

General Education Measures:

Students will demonstrate effective, persuasive, and professional written and oral communications through assignments and a presentation, in addition to class discussions. Students will develop a better understanding of the importance of diversity in groups and the impact of systems of power and privilege on differing groups. Students will learn the importance of emotional intelligence in developing empathy and becoming an effective leader. Students will learn to identify personal biases and discuss methods for overcoming those biases.

Communicate effectively

- Present written thoughts in a cohesive manner (influential leader reflection, personal leadership philosophy, self-assessment notebook)
- Synthesize information into a collective argument (personal leadership philosophy)
- Use formal grammar and mechanics (influential leader reflection, personal leadership philosophy, self-assessment notebook)
- Verbally present thoughts in an organized manner (influential leader presentation, student leader interview)

Develop ethical perspectives

- Identify examples of power and privilege (midterm, final exam)
- Explain the impact of power and privilege in everyday life (personal leadership philosophy)
- Describe personal beliefs, attitudes, and biases about people whose experiences, histories, cultures, and appearances are different than one's own (influential leader reflection)
- Apply empathy to change behavior and build better relationships
- Exhibit integrity and reliability in individual action and institutional activities
- Practice principle-centered leadership
- Demonstrate responsibility when interacting with new technologies and information

<u>Methodology:</u> The outcomes will be achieved through reflection, class assignments, critical thinking projects, exams/quizzes, and class discussions.

<u>Required Texts:</u> There are no required texts for students to purchase. Students will be provided access to articles and resources throughout the course.

Class Expectations:

- This is an academic course subject to all university guidelines and policies. As such, attendance and participation are critical to your success. Each one of us can learn a great deal from one another. You are awarded points for your active participation each week. Failure to participate in class will result in you not earning participation points for that class meeting.
- Be on time for all class meetings. Persistent or excessive tardiness may be considered unexcused absences.

- > The classroom is a safe place to express ideas, opinions, and beliefs. Within the class academic criticisms and discussions will take place, but behavior that impedes mutual respect of others or comments that are degrading or inappropriate will not be tolerated.
- Remain alert and attentive during all classes. Do what you need to do so that you are awake and mentally prepared to participate in each class.
- ➤ Be courteous and respectful to instructors and guest speakers. You will get to know your classmates well, so "side conversations" during class can be incredibly tempting and distracting. Please give others the same respect and attention you would expect to get if you were speaking.
- > Cell phones should be turned **OFF** or placed on silent during each class. There should be no phone use, texting, or browsing during class lectures or group activities.
- ➤ WebEx etiquette: For students who chose to engage remotely via WebEx, you must have your cameras on throughout the class meeting and have use of your microphone to participate in discussion (keeping background noise muted when you are not speaking). Background setting can be a wallpaper. Background setting should not be distracting to the rest of the class.
- Online etiquette: For students who chose to engage asynchronously online, you must keep in mind the class meeting days when submitting your discussion materials so that it is timely and can be included in face-to-face discussions. Class meetings will be recorded so that you may see the class discussions.

Technology Competencies:

Students are expected to demonstrate mastery and appropriate application of related technology competencies, including Word, PowerPoint, online research, email, and Blackboard. Important information such as class cancellations will be emailed through Blackboard, so be sure to check both your ATU email and Blackboard regularly.

Submitting Assignments in Blackboard:

For assignments, you will be able to click on the assignment listing and submit your work to me directly through Blackboard. You can add comments to the submission if you desire. Do not forget to attach the document for grading. It is a very common mistake to forget to attach and submit. Once you attach the work, you need to submit the work to me by hitting the submit button at the bottom of the page. Please note: All written assignments must be computer-generated, double-spaced, in APA format, and reflect university-level spelling, punctuation, and grammar.

<u>Evaluation: (650 possible points)</u> Students will be evaluated by completing self-assessments, active engagement in class discussions, critical thinking writing assignments, exams, and group interactions. All of your class assignments will be submitted via Blackboard.

Leader Interview:

Students will need to identify a current student leader on campus OR a community leader and interview them to gain insight on student leadership at the college level OR leadership at the community level. Share what leadership role (s) the individual holds on campus/in the community; what inspired them to get involved and hold the leadership duties they have; what challenges do they face in their leadership roles and what do they do to try and overcome these challenges; what advice would they give a student looking to hold a leadership position on campus or in the community; what has been the most rewarding thing they have gained from their leadership role; who influences them as a leader; what are their future aspirations. Be sure to share background information on the leader (i.e. classification; organization; previous leadership etc.) and what led you to select this individual to interview. You will submit this

information gathered by developing a typed two-page, double-spaced reflection paper, but not to exceed three typed pages (submitted in Blackboard).

Influential Leader Reflection/In-Class Presentation:

Students will research a leader they find to be influential and will write a reflection about that leader as well as present this information to the class. This can be an individual living today or a historical figure, but should not be a personal relationship (i.e. parent, grandparent, mentor, etc). The reflection should include background information on the individual selected; accomplishments this individual has achieved; a justification as to why they feel this individual is an influential leader; what characteristics from this individual do they want to emulate; what do they view as this person's strengths/growth areas; etc... The student will create a PowerPoint to show the class to make the presentation engaging and interactive. See course schedule for presentation date. The written reflection paper will also be due at the same time (in Blackboard) and will need to be at least two typed pages, double-spaced, but no longer than three typed pages. Students will need to include a reference page, showing at least two (2) educational sources cited in APA format.

Leadership in Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Written Assignment:

Students will submit their response to this unit's discussion questions as a separate assignment. Students should use the assigned readings to inform their responses. Although there is not a word count associated with each item, your responses should be comprehensive and address all aspects of each question. It would be difficult to fully address each question in less than one paragraph. On average, comprehensive responses to each question are a minimum of two paragraphs and a maximum of four.

Personal Leadership Philosophy:

Students will be asked to conduct a self-evaluation of the influences and factors which have shaped who they are. This activity will strengthen their self-awareness which is crucial for good leadership. Students will be asked to reflect on: what you value; who and what have influenced your values and philosophy; what does leadership mean to you; how have you been a leader in the past and what do you enjoy about being in leadership roles; looking at your self-assessments, what do you consider to be your top strengths and why; share your future leadership goals and what are you planning to do to hopefully achieve those goals. How does your leadership philosophy incorporate the potential or need for innovation? Consider how your leadership impacts those around you (i.e. followers, co-workers, peers). How does your leadership philosophy account for working with others and receiving their feedback (positive and negative) as well as promote inclusivity? Your reflection should be at least four typed, double-spaced pages, but no more than five typed pages (submitted in Blackboard). See template in Blackboard.

Ouizzes and Exams:

There will be multiple quizzes and two exams in the course. The mid-term exam will cover the materials presented during the first half of the course and the final exam be comprehensive.

Self-Directed Learning Project (HONORS)

Being an honors student comes with higher expectation for academic proficiency, intellectual curiosity, and motivation to learn. Through the completion of a self-directed learning project, honors students will have the opportunity to demonstrate their ability to proactively seek out academic challenges, manage their time, and seek mastery of course material beyond basic comprehensive though critical thinking,

application, and reflection. Self-directed means you, as the student, will select your topic of interest, identify learning needs, develop learning goals, identify and locate people and/or materials required for learning, implement learning strategies, and evaluate your learning. The topic of your project is entirely up to you with two requirements: it must relate to leadership/leadership development and it must involve engaging with people who are in leadership roles. If you can justify your topic relates to leadership/leadership development, it will work for this project.

The self-directed learning project has multiple phases. Students must complete all phases by the end of the course and meet checkpoint deadlines during the course.

- Phase 1: Topic Selection and Contract
- Phase 2: Develop Learning Goals
- Phase 3: Develop Learning Activities
- Phase 4: Engage in the Learning Process
- Phase 5: Evaluation
- Phase 6: Presentation

Class Participation/Assessments:

Each learning unit requires class attendance and active participation. Some learning units will include submission of a leadership self-assessment and/or quiz.

Attendance Defined

- Face-to-face: student submits initial response to discussion or quiz in Blackboard; student attends
 class in-person and fully engages in class discussion; student submits graded activities
- WebEx: student submits initial response to discussion or quiz in Blackboard; student attends class online via WebEx and fully engages in class discussion; student submits graded activities
- Asynchronous: student submits initial response to discussion or quiz in Blackboard; student fully
 participates and meets all online discussion and quiz deadlines and requirements; student submits
 graded activities

Subsequent cases of plagiarism will result in a minimum of one letter grade course reduction for each incident. In addition, any student who aids another student in plagiarism (e.g., provides a completed homework assignment to another student for submission) will be treated as also being involved in plagiarism and appropriate penalties will apply. Egregious cases of plagiarism (i.e., large sections copied from another source) will result in an automatic "F" for the course.

Excessive Unexcused Absences/Missed Assignments

If, at any time during the semester, you miss three units, your instructor may refer you to the Tech Early Warning Program. If you miss a fourth unit, your overall grade in the course will be negatively impacted. *More than five unexcused absences may result in being dropped from the class with a "WN" for excessive absences.* If by the midpoint of the course you have not earned a minimum of 40% of the available points possible, you can be dropped from the course by your instructor. Course Description

An examination of the unique ethical challenges faced by leaders with an emphasis on building ethical competency through self-assessment, challenge, and feedback. Topics include virtue ethics, evil, forgiveness, moral theories, moral reasoning, ethical decision-making, ethical influence, inclusion, ethical leadership theories, ethical group problem-solving, ethical organizational climate, ethical diversity, and ethical crisis leadership.

Learning Objectives and Assessments

- To recognize the ethical demands of the leadership role. Assessment: Quizzes/Exams, class participation, case analysis.
- 2. To measure personal ethical development. Assessment: Ethics/self-assessment log.
- To improve the ability to recognize, analyze, and resolve ethical dilemmas. Assessment: Ethics log, case analysis, class participation.
- To equip students to practice ethical leadership through moral behavior and moral influence. Assessment: Ethics log, quizzes/exams, case analysis.

Policies

- All written assignments must be computer-generated, double-spaced, in APA format, and reflect university-level spelling, punctuation, and grammar.
- Your attendance and participation is critical due to the interactive nature of the class. Attendance records will be kept, and excessive absences will lower this portion of your final grade.

Evaluation

Ethics/Self-Assessment Log and Ethical Leadership Development Plan

Complete six Self-Assessments (no more than one exercise per chapter. Three responses from Chapters 1–5 are due at mid-semester. The remaining entries from Chapters 6 - 10 are due at the end of the semester. An Ethical Leadership

Development Plan, based on self-assessment results, is due at the end of the semester.

Reflections

Students will complete three self-reflections (Units 3, 7, and 10) specific to the application of ethical leadership principles and practices, as well as ethical leadership development.

Exams

Exams will be given throughout the term to assess your knowledge of the concepts covered in this course. There is one exam for each of the four broad topics covered in the textbook.

Unit Pre-Test

A pre-test will be administered at the beginning of each learning unit to assess student content knowledge prior to completing the learning unit.

Case Analysis

Create your own case study based on contemporary events or personal experiences. Your case should include a description of the events along with an analysis and evaluation of the behavior of the leader based on course concepts.

Attendance/Participation Discussion

Each learning until has a corresponding discussion. ALL students, regardless of mode of attendance, submit their initial response to the discussion in Blackboard. This initial response counts toward the student's attendance record. Full participation through Blackboard posts, face-to-face discussion, and WebEx discussion is required to earn full points for attendance/participation.

Self-Directed Learning Project

Being an honors student comes with higher expectation for academic proficiency, intellectual curiosity, and motivation to learn. Through the completion of a self-directed learning project, honors students will have the opportunity to demonstrate their ability to proactively seek out academic challenges, manage their time, and reach mastery of course material beyond basic comprehensive though critical thinking, application, and reflection. Self-directed means you, as the student, will select your topic of interest, identify learning needs, develop learning goals, identify and locate people and/or

materials required for learning, implement learning strategies, and evaluate your learning. The topic of your project is entirely up to you with two requirements: it must relate to ethics/ethical development and it must involve engaging with people who are in leadership roles. If you can justify your topic relates to leadership/leadership development, it will work for this project.

The self-directed learning project has multiple phases. Students must complete all phases by the end of the course and meet checkpoint deadlines during the course.

- · Phase 1: Topic Selection and Contract
- Phase 2: Develop Learning Goals
- Phase 3: Develop Learning Activities
- Phase 4: Engage in the Learning Process
- Phase 5: Evaluation
- Phase 6: Presentation

followed. If you have excessive absences, your grade will be impacted and you might be dropped from the course.

Academic Misconduct

University policy will be followed. At a minimum, the student (and any student caught assisting in the misconduct) will be given an automatic "F" for the test/assignment in question and possibly an "F" for the course. Subsequent cases of plagiarism will result in a minimum of one letter grade course reduction for each incident. Co-requisite: MATH 2914 and PHYS 2000.

Catalog Description: This honors course is designed for physics and engineering majors and focuses on introductory mechanics including kinematics, force, energy, work, and conservation of linear and angular momentum. Heat and fluids are also introduced. Lecture and laboratory. \$40 laboratory fee.

Dr. Young's Goal for Every Student: My goal for you is that you will *understand* basic classical mechanics, be able to apply these concepts in future upper-level courses, and appreciate the impact classical physics has on your everyday life.

Course Objectives: in conjunction with the lab, his course should provide students with a foundation in classical introductory physics topics such as kinematics, force concepts, work/energy, gravitation, heat, and fluids. In addition to providing a conceptual foundation, mathematical ability will be developed to manipulate formulas to derive correct symbolic and numerical solutions. Finally, students should learn/develop problem-solving skills by applying relevant physical models and formulas to physical problems.

After the semester, students should be able to:

- 1. [Dimensional Analysis and Unit Conversion]
 - a Apply dimensional analysis to verify the correctness of physical equations.
 - b Perform unit conversions across different measurement systems to ensure consistency in calculations.
- 2. [Linear and Two-Dimensional Motion]

a Demonstrate an understanding of linear and two-dimensional motion by applying kinematic equations to solve problems involving displacement, velocity, acceleration, and time.

3. [Forces and Newton's Laws]

- a Summarize Newton's three laws of motion and apply them to physical situations involving multiple forces.
- b Construct and analyze free-body diagrams to set up and solve problems involving equilibrium and net external forces.

4. [Work and Energy]

- a Demonstrate an understanding of work, kinetic energy, and potential energy.
- b Apply the work-energy theorem to analyze and solve problems involving energy conservation in mechanical systems.

5. [Momentum and Collisions]

- a Apply the law of conservation of momentum to analyze elastic and inelastic collisions in both one and two dimensions.
- b Evaluate scenarios to determine whether momentum and/or kinetic energy are conserved during a collision.

6. [Rotational Motion and Angular Momentum]

- a Demonstrate an understanding of **rotational kinematics** by solving problems involving angular displacement, velocity, and acceleration.
- b Analyze and solve problems involving torques, moments of inertia, and angular momentum.
- c Apply the conservation of angular momentum to physical systems such as rotating bodies and orbital systems.

7. [Gravitation and Orbital Mechanics]

- a Apply Newton's Law of Universal Gravitation to calculate gravitational forces between massive objects.
- b Demonstrate an understanding of Kepler's laws to solve problems related to orbital motion and gravitational fields.

Cell Phones: Cell phones are not allowed outside during class, and you will not be allowed to use your phone as a calculator.

Attendance: Attendance is mandatory. Absences will be excused for qualifying ATU sponsored events with appropriate documentation. Students will be responsible for any material missed during an excused absence. If you cannot physically attend class due to illness, please contact Dr. Young to arrange an

alternate attendance method or make-up work BEFORE the missed class session. If Dr. Young cannot attend class physically, you will receive further instructions via email.

NOTE: Missing an excessive amount of class will lead to receiving a grade of FE (failure for excessive absences) for this course. Per the ATU faculty handbook, students will be warned via email before the assignment of this grade.

- → "In-Class" Work: You must be present the entire class period to earn in-class points for the day. Most assignments will be submitted on Blackboard immediately after class. All in-class assignments will be submitted on Blackboard. The submission links will appear after your attendance for the day is recorded. NO ATTENDANCE – NO SUBMISSION
- → Homework: Every chapter covered will have an associated homework assignment. Assignments will be posted on Blackboard and will be submitted through WebAssign.

- ➤ Exams: There will be 3 midterm exams and one final exam. See the course calendar for tentative midterm exam dates. The final exam will be held at the scheduled time. There is no planned makeup for any exam. If you will miss a midterm exam due to a university-sponsored event, you must contact Dr. Young before the missed exam to schedule an alternative exam time.
- → Lab: You are required to attend lab per lab policies. Lab grade will be 20% of your overall grade in this course.
