Facts from the Data

- ATU has more than doubled the number of programs it offers over the last two decades, while not quite doubling the major options it offers to ATU students. Minor program options have grown over the last decade, but not as significantly.
- ATU has grown its degree offerings significantly. In addition to baccalaureate degrees, ATU offers certificate programs, associates degrees, masters degrees, and now a doctorate degree (EDD).
- ATU has seen the size of its freshman class more than double over the last two decades.
- ATU has seen the number of students seeking associates degrees grow astronomically (36.5 times larger) from 2004 to 2014, after seeing virtually NO GROWTH for a decade (1993-2004).
- ATU has seen the number of incoming freshman seeking bachelors
- The entering graduate class has more than doubled from 1994 to 2004 and then tripled from 2004 to 2014.
- ATU is one of the 10 fastest-growing master's degree-granting universities in America for both 2013 and 2014. It is also the fastest-growing university in Arkansas (<u>https://www.atu.edu/futurestudents.php</u>)
- Both the size of the faculty and staff has just over doubled in two decades.
- We continue to attract and serve more traditional age college students than nontraditional ones. While the ratio of traditional college students has grown in proportion to nontraditional ones over the last two decades, the growth has only been from 3 out of 5 to every 2 out of 3 students being traditional college age.
- Undergraduate tuition more than doubled from 1994 to 2004 and has more than quadrupled from 1994 to 2014. Graduate tuition has almost doubled and almost quadrupled in those same time periods. Ozark tuition has almost tripled in the last decade (2004 to 2014).
- While the number of students ATU can house on campus has grown, the proportion of our students we are housing on campus has declined significantly by almost 10% in a decade. As students living on campus is one of the keys to retention, this is a disconcerting finding.

• In less than a decade, the number of students enrolling in courses using online instruction has more than tripled. Likewise, the percentage of courses at ATU that are online has doubled from 7% to 14% in that same time period.
