- Commercial Recreation (RP 3033) The course content will introduce the spectrum of planning, delivery and assessment of goods and services in the commercial sector of parks and recreation.
- Work Experience (RP 3043) Supervised field application of class skills and knowledge in Parks and Recreation work situations. Students are given the opportunity to take part in meaningful management and work experiences in actual work situations under the supervision of both university faculty and professionals in the field.
- Research Methods (RP 4023) An introduction to the spirit and theory of research. The scientific method and its application to the recreation and park profession.
- Internship (RP 4114) Placement in selected agency settings in student intern status under professional guidance of both agency supervisor and faculty. Emphasis will be placed on application of classroom theory to agency requirements which fulfill student's individual career interests.
- Wilderness First Aid Special Topic (RP 4991) Trained laypersons to respond appropriately to emergency situations in wilderness or remote settings. The course content and activities will prepare you to better recognize emergencies, make first aid decisions, and provide care with little or no first aid supplies or equipment.

- Community Recreation (REC 3433) Acquaint students with a variety of community based activities and skills related to the recreation profession. The course will focus on skill development and theories related to community engagement. Issues related to diverse populations and values associated with recreational activities will be examined during the course as well.

- First Aid & CPR (HLTH 2212) Trained laypersons to respond appropriately to emergency situations. The course content and activities will prepare you to better recognize emergencies, make first aid decisions, and provide care with little or no first aid supplies or equipment.
- Healthy Life Skills (HLTH 1112) Comprehensive investigation into current methods of health promotion and disease prevention. Knowledge and practical application in the areas of

- fitness, nutrition, and substance prevention, and other positive life skills will be emphasized.
- Flatwater Canoe & Kayak (PHED 2000) Experiential opportunities to learn the fundamentals for flatwater kayaking and canoeing.
